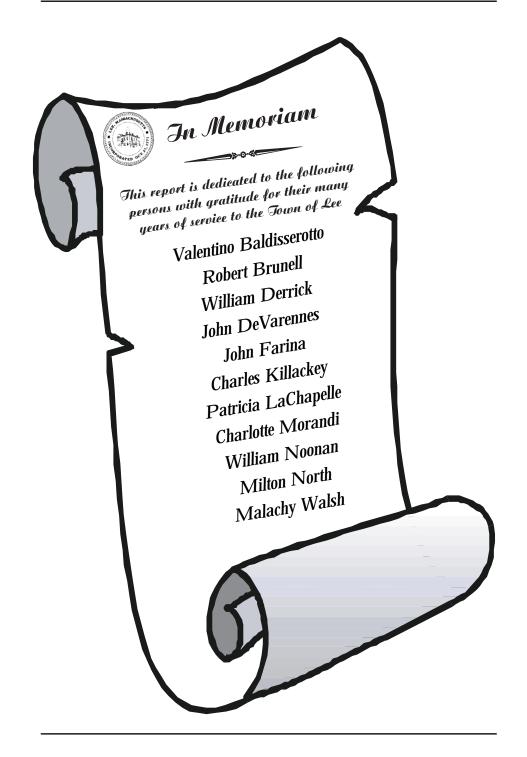

# BOARD OF SELECTMEN & TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

**D**uring the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011 (FY 2011) slow economic recovery from the 2008-2009 "Great Recession" continued to strain the Town's finances and to hold back the reuse of the four paper mills that closed on the eve of the recession. Nevertheless, there was significant economic development activity downtown and progress on two energy efficiency projects. The fiscal year will also be remembered for the number of long-term employees who retired.

Despite the absence of a cost of living increase for school and municipal employees and level funding for education, the General Fund budget increased by \$297,400, because of a 10% increase in employee benefits, principally the Town's 75% share of health insurance premiums. There was a \$159,000 net increase in local receipts. New meals tax and increased room tax revenues helped to counter continued decreases in investment income, school tuition and various local fees. The local receipts increase was offset by a \$138,000 decrease in state aid. These factors contributed to a \$136.00 or 4.3% increase in the average single family home property tax burden.

There was significant staff turnover in FY 2011. In August 2010, after 19 years of service to the Town, Susan Kelley ended her 12 year term as Town Treasurer to pursue an opportunity in banking. Donna Toomey, who had served as Sue's clerk for 12 years, succeeded her. In October 2010, Heavy Equipment Operator Stanley Daoust retired from the Department of Public Works (DPW) after serving 33 years. DPW Truck Driver/Laborer Paul Porrini stepped up to Stan's position and seasonal employee Richard Neales filled Paul's Truck Driver/Laborer position. In February, 2011 after serving nearly 43 years as a Town of Lee volunteer firefighter, Ronald Driscoll retired from the position of chief which he had held for 22 years. Deputy Chief Alan Sparks succeeded Ron, and 1st Assistant Paul Giarolo became Deputy Chief Changes in full-time staff accelerated at the end of FY 2011.

After 11 years of service to the Towns of Lee, Lenox and Stockbridge, Tri-Town Health Department Deputy Director Kim Kelly resigned in April of 2011 to accept a position with a private health care provider. Her departure came on the eve of long-time Director Peter Kolodziej's retirement after 37 1/2 years of service to the tri-towns. Fortunately, in May 2011 Pittsfield Board of Health Director James Wilusz, Kim's husband and Peter's protégé, accepted the challenge of returning to lead the Tri-Town Health Department. On June 21, 2011 Ronald Glidden announced his intention to retire in September 2011 after serving more than 1 7 years as Police Chief. After nearly 24 years of service as Library Director, Georgia Massucco retired on June 30, 2011. Her successor, Daniel Paquette joined the library staff on July 5,

2011. DPW Secretary, Virginia Vania, also retired on June 30th and Angela Cook succeeded her.

In addition to this turnover among key, long-serving, full-time staff, there were other personnel changes in FY 2011. In April 2011 part-time Custodian/Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), Thomas Arment left to accept full-time employment and he was succeeded by Peter Willey. Daniel Kimberly was also appointed to serve as a Custodian/EMT, but on an "as needed" basis.

Robert Williams, Maria Broderick, David Carpenter, Tinamarie Carpenter and Burton Johnson joined the ranks of the Ambulance Service EMTs. Jeremy Richardson was appointed to serve as an alternate building inspector when needed. Benjamin Towne was appointed to serve as a Special Police Officer.

Bryan Carlino was reappointed to serve as a seasonal truck driver/laborer during the winter of 2010-2011. In the summer of 2011 Alek 0' Brien and Charles Fresia returned to serve as DPW groundskeepers. Karyn Sutter served as the DPW Water Division Engineering intern. At Sandy Beach Angell Burnell returned to assume the role of Managing Lifeguard. She was aided by returning Senior Lifeguards Katie Barnoski, Cassandra Lillie, Samantha Brown, Jeanne Schnackenberg and Benjamin Kline. Also returning to the beach were maintenance/operations person Ed Handberg and groundskeeper, Dmitri Consolati.

Although the reuse of four paper mills that closed on the eve of the 2008-2009 "Great Recession" remained the top economic development priority, the economy's slow recovery inhibited our efforts to attract new investment to provide employment opportunities and an expanded property tax and utility fee base. Nevertheless, through the efforts of the Lee Community Development Corporation (CDC), the assistance of Berkshire Regional Planning Commission and MassDevelopment and our use of state and federal grants totally \$150,000, we are poised to succeed. Led by CDC Executive Director Richard Vinette, we established an expedited permitting process for the Laurel and Eagle Mills and in August of 2010 we completed a Developer's Workbook and an Implementation Plan for the reuse of the Eagle Mill. While the weak economy held back the reuse of the mills, downtown revitalization received a boost through a private/public partnership.

Private and public investment totaling nearly \$5 million dollars led to the restoration of 40-50 Main Street and the creation of a 56 space, municipal parking lot on adjacent land between Franklin Street, High Street and Park Place. Through the efforts of the Lee CDC Executive Director Richard Vinette, the Commonwealth's Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development granted the Town \$735,000 for the parking lot design and construction, because it leveraged the College Internship Program's \$3.75 million dollar private investment in the restoration of 40-

50 Main Street. Since the cost of purchasing property for the parking lot was not included in the grant, the Town contributed \$148,866.68 from Community Development Block Grant miscellaneous program income and the \$219,458.97 school construction borrowing surplus.

The Town's principal acquisition was the \$275,000 purchase of Saint George's Rectory, which was demolished to provide parking spaces and lot access from Franklin Street. The Lee CDC purchased Dr. Peter Cerruti's home and office at the corner of Franklin and High Streets, and sold the Town a portion of the lot for \$93,325 to complete the assembly of property needed for the parking lot. Verizon donated an easement for access from High Street and a portion of land for the parking lot. The building renovations began in the fall of 2010 and the parking lot work, delayed by an unusually snowy winter, began in the spring of 2011. Again through the efforts of the Lee CDC Executive Director Richard Vinette, in April 2011 the Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development granted the Town \$452,680 to improve the alleyway connecting the parking lot to Main Street. By the end of June 2011, the building and parking lot work were substantially complete and the alleyway improvements were underway.

To further downtown redevelopment, the Select Board accepted the Berkshire Housing Development Corporation's offer to prepare a state Economic Development Fund grant application to complete the financing of BHDC' purchase and renovation 57 Main Street. BRPC plans to preserve the building's 16 affordable apartments and the first floor commercial spaces.

In addition to this economic development activity, there was significant progress on two energy efficiency projects. Drinking water treatment plant energy efficiency measures, including a hydroelectric turbine upgrade and a photovoltaic installation, were substantially completed. The project was financed through the State Drinking Water Revolving Fund which used American Recover and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funding to forgive the \$721,466 loan. The renewable electricity generation and efficiency measures are expected to reduce the plants energy cost by over \$10,000 per year. Thermal efficiency improvements at the Central and South Lee Fire Stations, which are both heated by oil, were also substantially completed. The project was financed by a \$62,000 ARRA grant through the Commonwealth's Department of Energy Resources. Those ARRA funds, together with building and energy efficiency appropriations, paid for added attic insulation at the Central Fire Station, and building envelope improvements at the South Lee Fire Station/Post Office. Through the completion of this project the Town anticipates energy cost savings of more than \$4,000 per year.

The impact of the slow economic recovery on state-aid and receipts makes it difficult to maintain services. To control expenses we will continue to explore ener-

gy saving efficiencies and cost sharing opportunities. We will continue to focus our efforts on economic development that will provide employment opportunities and an expanded property tax and utility rate base

In closing we would like to thank all of our town employees and volunteers for their service to the community. We are especially grateful for the time and efforts of our fire department and ambulance service volunteers and those who serve without compensation on town boards, committees and commissions. In particular we extend our thanks to Suzanne Alderman who we each rely on for organizational support and administrative assistance.

The Town of Lee employs a total of 490 full and part time employees and maintains its commitment to our employees to educate and encourage them in regard to wellness. The following wellness programs sponsored by MIIA were implemented: 6 week Yoga, Health 2011 Challenge, 10-week winter walking fitness program (twice a week), Chair Massages, and our annual wellness fair.

We currently offer our employees health insurance, life insurance, whole and universal insurance, accident and disability insurance, two separate voluntary retirement plans, a flexible spending plan and dental insurance. This past year we also added a vision insurance product. We always strive to get the best product and prices with most of these renegotiated each year. We also rely on the input from the Insurance Advisory Committee which consists of the following members: Paul Porrini, Joe Turmel, Betty Leahey, Glenn Withers, Patricia Moterella, Mark Hungate, Donna Kresiak, and Craig DeSantis. We continue to purchase our health insurance through MIIA and received a 9.9% increase in rates. We are in the last year of a third year contract for life insurance through Standard Life Insurance. This office appreciates and thanks each of the members for their participation on this committee.

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

T he following is the annual report of the Department of Public Works for the fiscal year 2011 (FY11).

#### **Highway Division**

The primary responsibility of the Highway Department is to maintain the towns highway and bridge infrastructure. This year town employees modified problem drainage areas, patched potholes, landscaped roadsides, and completed a multitude of roadway and bridge maintenance projects.

In addition to the towns forces, a private contractor was retained to reconstruct and resurface various town roads. The following roads were reconstructed and repaved: Orchard Street and a portion of Spring Street.

The winter season was handled superbly by the Highway Department. Dennis Kelly and his staff performed with excellence during extremely adverse and tiring conditions. The town utilized 2,500 tons of salt and countless man hours to provide safe traveling for the public.

#### **Forestry**

The DPW continues to receive numerous requests to remove trees. The budget is limited as to the number that can be removed. We prioritize tree removal to those that are of an imminent danger to the public.

#### **Water Division**

The Water Department strives to provide all users with excellent water and uninterrupted service. This fiscal year the Water Department finished 252 million gallons of potable water. The towns Water Supervisor, Mike Towler and his staff continue to maintain, operate, and initiate improvements to the distribution system, storage tanks, treatment plant, reservoirs, access road, and watershed. With the towns aging water system, these tasks become increasingly difficult. Mike and his staff should be commended on their effort to maintain the system.

#### Distribution System:

A Consultant was retained by the town to locate all water infrastructure and its appurtenances. The GPS mapping is complete and can be reviewed at the DPW office on Railroad Street.

#### Water Plant:

In FY10 Mike Towler and I applied for an ARRA Grant to provide energy effi-

ciency upgrades to the plant. The EPA and DEP looked favorably on our application and awarded the town an \$800,000.00 reusable energy enhancement grant. CDM, from Cambridge, Mass was chosen to design the enhancements for the plant. Subsequently, a contractor, Waterline Industries from Seabrook, NH was awarded the contract to implement these improvements. The improvements will be completed by the end of the year.

#### **Sewer Division**

The Sewer Departments primary responsibility is to collect, pump, and treat raw sewage. This fiscal year the Sewer Department treated approximately 306 million gallons of raw sewage. The towns Waste Water Supervisor, Alan Zerbato and his staff continue to maintain, operate, monitor, and initiate improvements to the collection system, and pump stations. The new Waste Water Treatment Plant is operating superbly and is producing a "quality" effluent without permit violations.

#### Collection System:

This year there were 9 new sewer connections, adding additional revenue to the department. Town staff responded to 45 after hour alarms, 10 sewer line blockages, replaced 4 troubled locations with new sewer pipe, and performed preventative maintenance for 5 pump stations and 26 miles of collection lines throughout the town. In addition, a consultant was retained by the town to locate all sewerage infrastructure and its appurtenances. The GPS mapping is complete and can be reviewed at the DPW office on Railroad Street.

#### Waste Water Treatment Plant:

This year the town continues to conduct a phosphorous removal pilot program. This was mandated by the EPA. The in-house program continues with excellent results, and thanks to Al Zerbato and his staffs efforts have saved the town the cost of a consultant and additional processing equipment. The plant is still on a demand response program with WMECO. This program pays the town money to be on-call. To offset incurred costs of the new plant, the Sewer Department accepted and treated 1,700,000 gallons of septage. The revenue generated by this undertaking was \$170,000.00. In addition, the town received the very prestigious Aqua-Aerobics Plant Performance Award for Operational Excellence. Nice job Al, Craig, Todd and Myron.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

#### To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

As I submit my final Town Report, I would like to thank all the Town employees and staff of the Town Hall for their assistance and support for the past 17 years. It has been a pleasure to serve the Town of Lee.

Motor vehicle accidents were down for the third straight year in part once again as a result of increased traffic enforcement. The enforcement efforts of Officers Jeff Roosa and Ryan Lucy continue to be largely responsible for both our increase in citations and the reduction in accidents. The enforcement efforts of several other officers also contributed to this decline in accidents. Officer Burdick, one of the Department's sexual assault investigators, was the lead investigator on several sexual assault cases that were successfully prosecuted this year. Officer Adrian Kohlenberger, in his important role as School Resource Officer, handled numerous investigations at our schools this year and saw them through to successful prosecution in both juvenile and adult courts where appropriate.

Officers Jeffrey Roosa and Craig DeSantis continued their participation with the Berkshire County Special Response Team. The cost to the department for their participation is minimal and in turn the officers receive exceptional training at no cost which greatly benefits our department. Officer Ryan Lucy was assigned on a part-time basis to the Berkshire County Drug Task Force. Officer Todd Briggs was assigned on a part-time basis to a federal "Safe Streets" task force. The cost of task force participation is paid mostly from the respective county or federal task force.

In closing, I would like to thank Sgt. Joseph Buffis for his supervisory assistance, and I would like to thank all our officers for their investigative and enforcement efforts and their dedicated service to the community. I would also like to thank Tracy Dunn for her hard work as the police secretary. In addition, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and Town Representatives for their support.

## LEE AMBULANCE SERVICE

I hereby submit the annual report of the Lee Ambulance Service for the year 2011. During this year your ambulance service responded to a total of 832 requests for medical assistance, resulting in the transport of 736 patients to area hospitals.

Lee Ambulance is an accredited training institution and is offering EMT classes for our residents and others at no cost or a reduced fee for a one year commitment to the service. ## **CULTURAL COUNCIL**

#### **T**o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The Lee Cultural Council is one of the 329 councils established statewide as part of the Local Cultural Council (LCC) Program administered by the Massachusetts Cultural Council. This program is the largest grassroots cultural funding network in the nation supporting thousands of community-based projects in the arts, humanities, and interpretive sciences. The program promotes the availability of rich cultural experiences for every Massachusetts citizen. Each year, local councils award more than \$2 million in grants to more than 5,000 cultural programs statewide. These include school field trips, afterschool programs, concerts, festivals, lectures, theater, dance, music, and film. LCC projects take place in schools, community centers, libraries, elder care facilities, town halls, parks, and wherever communities come together.

In fiscal 2011, the Lee Cultural Council received over 40 grant applications of which 20 were approved for funds totaling \$5,150.00 (including the state allocation of \$3,870). Approved applicants/programs included the Becket Arts Center (Camp Imagination), Berkshire Theater Festival (BTF Plays! School Residency at St. Mary's School), Lee Elementary School (BTF's History's Mysteries), Berkshire Concert Choir (Choral Jazz Convert), John Root (Senior Citizen Musical program), Flying Cloud Institute (Youth Environmental Summit), the Housatonic Philharmonic (winter concert) and Sculpture Now (SculptureNow and Creative Youth).

Additionally, local cultural councils have broad powers under the Massachusetts General Laws to produce their own council-originated events, to raise funds and to hire staff or independent contractors to carry out the general purpose of promoting the arts, humanities and interpretive sciences. In Fiscal 2011, the council voted to retain it's first ever Program Director, Chris Collins of Lee, in order to enhance its mission and its role in Lee by producing events and programs which support the arts, humanities and interpretive sciences and which benefit the town in general. This endeavor has resulted in the creation of new programs and events which are already occurring in Fiscal Year 2012.

The council would also like to thank former council members for their work and contributions to the arts.

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORP.

The Lee Community Development Corporation, a private non-profit economic development organization, continues to encourage growth, investment and jobs for the Town of Lee and across the region.

During 2010-2011 the Lee CDC and the Town, with the assistance of State Rep. Smitty Pignatelli were able to secure funding for the final design and construction of the East Side Development Project. This project, which includes a 61 car parking lot and a handicap access to Main Street through a landscaped walkway, was funded by a \$1.2 Million grant from the MassWorks Infrastructure program through the Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development. The project was developed in conjunction with a private sector investment of approximately \$4 Million in the rehabilitation of the Baird-Benton Block at 40-50 Main Street by the College Internship Program. Construction of the project was completed in December, 2011.

The Lee CDC also has worked to encourage and facilitate economic development in other locations in the town. Through its involvement in planning activities and funding strategies for a variety of projects, the CDC continues to promote development of a number of projects. Among these are pedestrian and bike trails and greenways along the Housatonic River. The CDC is involved in the "rest of the river" discussions with General Electric, EPA and DEP and has continued to work with local and regional organizations to voice concerns over many aspects of the proposed clean-up of the Housatonic River.

In August, 2011 through the assistance of Berkshire Regional Planning and the Jacob's Ladder Trail Committee, the Lee Bike Path Committee and the Lee CDC were pleased to announce the receipt of a \$293,000 federal grant and \$73,000 matching funds from the Mass Department of Transportation. The funding package is to be used for final design of the southern half of a proposed nearly seven-mile multi-use bike and pedestrian path.

During 2010 funded by a grant from Western Mass Electric Company, the Lee CDC has developed marketing materials to promote investment and job growth in Lee.

We wish to thank all of our local and regional partners, friends and supporters as we look forward, with them, to meet future challenges and opportunities for the community.

## TRI-TOWN HEALTH DEPARTMENT

**T**o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

On behalf of the Lee, Lenox, and Stockbridge Boards of Health, we would like to dedicate the Tri-Town Health Department Fiscal Year 2011 Annual Report to Peter J. Kolodziej for his 37 years of dedicated service to Tri-Town Health Department. As you may know, Peter played an instrumental role for many years by setting public health policies in the community in an effort to enhance public health. His leadership and his trend setting vision have been clearly documented and the programs he has left behind still remain evident. We wish Peter and his family the best of luck and thank them for allowing Peter to dedicate his time to serve his communities.

I hereby submit my annual report for the fiscal year 2011

#### Following is a summary of our Public Health Prevention programs:

<u>Title 5 On-Site Wastewater Disposal</u>: Despite the slow economy, we continue to see a great deal of time allocated towards on-site wastewater upgrade, which includes percolation testing, Title 5 inspections, and plan reviews.

**Food Service Sanitation Program:** Routine food service establishment inspections were conducted in accordance with State Sanitary Code Chapter X Minimum Sanitation Standards for Food Establishments. In general, most establishments observed are following sound sanitation practices. Our bacteriological laboratory program of sampling the ice in all establishments has over time proven to be an effective tool in evaluating general sanitary practices.

Pool & Spa/ /Public/Semi Public Beaches: Senior Health Inspector Melissa Lanoue is assigned the task of inspecting, sampling and monitoring public semi-public pools/spas and bathing beaches. This required effectively communicating the public health significance of this program to Property Managers, Beach Operators and Certified Pool Operators to ensure that bacteriological and sanitary standards are met prior to use. Melissa has increased her efforts with beach operators this season to ensure compliance with the amended State Department of Public Health minimum standards for bathing beaches. The amendment requires all public and semi-public beaches to be permitted by the Board of Health. We hope in FY12 that we will have the ability to post on the website weekly results of water quality of our beaches.

<u>Tobacco Awareness Program</u>: We are pleased to announce that we have received an additional seven (7) years of Tobacco Grant funding. The Tobacco Awareness Program is grant funded by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health

and provides a variety of tobacco control services for 12 Berkshire County communities. Other grant deliverables include merchant education; working with store owners and managers by coordinating several tobacco subcommittee meetings throughout the year; providing parent engagement education through community outreach and presentations; and conducting tobacco compliance checks at every tobacco retailer in the 12 community collaborative. Studies have shown that tobacco sales to minors have decreased; nevertheless, we are continuing our efforts working with local Boards of Health to further reduce the number of tobacco sales to minors and to educate tobacco retail clerks about the most effective methods to use to accomplish that objective.

Tobacco Retailer Training Program: A major part of our scope of service is to conduct Tobacco Retailer Trainings. This year, office staff provided 36 trainings that educated 401 tobacco retail clerks making our grand total over 1,500. This program received two (2) independent evaluations, which conclude that such programs correlate positively with reduced illegal tobacco sales. We thank all of our partners for their continued support in ensuring that this type of program remains viable.

Mass in Motion Grant: Year two of the Mass in Motion grant is complete and we have been awarded Year 3 grant funding. The focus of the grant utilizes our regional approach in working with community partners; building on already in-place structures and Built Environment models; assessing sustainable policy; systematic and environmental change; and strengthening community-wide accessibility to effectively reduce obesity and encourage healthy lifestyles. The Lee Selectmen have signed a Healthy Meeting Resolution agreeing to offer healthy options at all municipal meetings. The Selectmen also signed and support the Built Environment and Community Design resolution and are now utilizing the resolution as a tool to increase physical activity behaviors in our community.

**Be Well Berkshires:** Our working group was created in 2009. It consists of local school officials, nutritionists, restaurants, Lee Visiting Nurses Association, grocery stores, etc. After many meetings and much discussion, the group put together a Healthier Dining Resolution in which establishments around the 3-town collaborative have voluntarily signed on to offer healthier options on their menus. Establishments will be highlighted monthly in the media and walking maps to show that they offer healthier choices. There was a school-wide logo creation contest with six regional schools where over 150 logos were submitted. The plan is for this logo to be displayed on menus, windows, doors, t-shirts etc... The logo is in the final stages of approval and will be utilized for many purposes.

Attorney General's Hypertension Grant: The Tri-Town Health Department, in collaboration with Berkshire Health Systems, was awarded the Attorney General's Hypertension Grant. The grant was kicked off during a free event that was opened to the public to allow people to get their Blood Pressure taken as well

as enjoy some healthy snacks and become educated on risks for Hypertension. During that event, several Berkshire County restaurants offered a 10% off coupon for healthier options on their menus. The event was a great success and everyone who attended learned a bit more about hypertension.

**Peter Kolodziej:** Peter retired after 37 years of dedicated service to Public Health. Peter will be greatly missed for all of his hard work!

**James Wilusz, R.S.:** Jim was hired as the new Director of Public Health and is looking forward to continuing and enhancing the tradition of community based public health programs which TTHD has offered for many decades.

**Kimberly Kelly:** Kim accepted a position at Berkshire Health Systems as the Community Health Education Coordinator. We would like to thank Kim for all of her years serving our communities and wish her the best of luck in her new position!

**Melissa Lanoue and Amanda Cozzaglio:** We would like to thank Senior Health Inspector Melissa Lanoue and Prevention Program Coordinator Amanda Cozzaglio for all their dedicated hard work in ensuring our initiatives and programs remain a success.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Lee, Lenox and Stockbridge Boards of Health for their continued support and assistance and the Tri-Town Health Department staff for their dedication and public service in providing essential public health prevention programs to the communities we serve.

The Lee Council on Aging is committed to providing services and programs to the community elders 60 years of age and older. Services include health related clinics, educational programs directed at elders and families and support members.

Services also include transportation to the Senior Center programs and for medical appointments, shopping, errands and other appointments, and some recreational and social programs.

Nutritional meals are served at the Senior Center Monday through Friday in the Community room at Crossway Village. Meals on Wheels are delivered Monday through Friday to home bound Seniors.

A MA state-trained counselor offers Health Insurance information. AARP provides State and Federal Income Tax preparers at the Center during February and March to Seniors. General information and advocacy to seniors and their families is available. The COA coordinates programs with the Lee Visiting Nurse Association and Elder Services of Berkshire County.

The Council on Aging served an estimated 475 seniors during the fiscal year 2011. The COA operates with a Director, Secretary, Transportation Driver, Nutritional Site Director along with many volunteers to provide services to the community.

## **VETERANS' BENEFITS AND SERVICES**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

This office serves the needs of the Veterans' of Lee and their families. The case load of Veterans' Services has increased this year. The amount of funds expended was almost double of FY2010.

The greatest need continues to be for veterans' widows who have very little income and are unable to work. There were also several Veterans' who needed help while waiting for benefits from other agencies such as Social Security and the Veterans' Administration Disability. We were able to assist in getting benefits from these agencies, and also provided financial assistance until approval from these agencies.

Each person on Veterans' Benefits is required to apply for the Low Income Heating Assistance Program (LIHEAP). Once the funds are expended, we were able to help these vets with additional fuel assistance.

For FY2011 there continued to be many requests for information concerning what benefits a Veteran is entitled to for medical assistance and prescriptions. We were able to help get that information and to fill ou the necessary forms. And, for the second straight year, we saw a large increase in the amount of veterans and their spouses who were applying for "Aid and Attendance." This is a Veterans' Administration program to assist veterans and their spouses who are housebound or in a nursing home, unable to care for themselves, and have limited income.

MISSION: CTSB is a 501c(3) organization that facilitates, encourages and promotes community television with locally oriented non-commercial programming and other media. The content may be informative, educational or entertaining. CTSB serves the Five Towns of Great Barrington, Lee, Lenox, Sheffield and Stockbridge.

Primary funding for CTSB is based on a formula derived from the subscriber billings of Time Warner in the Five Towns. CTSB is entirely independent of Time Warner, but under federal law, the cable company is obligated to provide community Access Channels for: Public Access (Ch 16), Education Access (Ch 17), and Government Access (Ch 18.) The audited CTSB annual report, with complete programming for the year, is available at its office: 925 Pleasant St. South Lee.

High school and adult volunteers from the Five Towns produce shows, with training and guidance from professional staff in many phases of television production including: studio & field camera, editing, audio, directing and producing. Every year CTSB sponsors a video contest for students in K-12 from Lee, Lenox, Southern Berkshire or Berkshire Hills School Districts, with \$1,200 in cash prizes.

CTSB-TV Bulletin Board is a free service for organizations, schools, clubs, etc. to announce upcoming events and services.

Channel 16, Public Access, features local programming including The Fall Festival of Shakespeare, Lenox Caroling Festival, Lee Founders Day, July 4th festivities, Lenox Tub parade, Berkshire Concert Choir, Occupy the Berkshires, Great Barrington 250th Anniversary events, Holiday Piano Concert and Zebra Mussel issues. The weekly "Walkabout" series features interviews with area residents. Many programs are repeated online at CTSBTV.org

Channel 17, Educational Access, features School Board and Committee meetings, delivering information first-hand to families with children who are interested in school program development. TV coverage makes it possible to "attend" meetings from home. Parents thus informed are better prepared to examine changing policies. High School baseball and football are viewer favorites. High School sport coverage is made possible by financial underwriting generously given by area businesses. Schedules are available at CTSBTV.org

Channel 18, Government Access, televises Select Board and Town Meetings of all Five Towns as well as special meetings as requested, with several repeat showings each month. The schedule of coverage is available at CTSBTV.org

The Board of Directors, comprised of representatives of the Five Towns, governs CTSB. All board members are volunteers and are unpaid. Full-time Professional staff members are: Leo W. Mahoney, Station Manager; Nick Ring, Operations Manager; and Steven Borns, Programming Coordinator.

## LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

**D**uring the year July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011, the Lee Library Association saw a number of changes, most notably the changes in library staff. Linda Croze, Joey Blache, and Library Director Georgia Massucco all retired after over 90 years of combined service to the residents of Lee. Dawn Simmons and new Library Director, Daniel Paquette, have joined the library to continue offering exceptional service to the community.

Bill Derrick, long-time custodian, also retired last year, but sadly, passed away a few months later to illness. To honor Bill's years of service, a marble bench was installed by the walkway to the library's front door. Mickey Sparks is the new custodian of the library. The library was also saddened with the passing of Bill Noonan, the treasurer of the Board of Directors. Tom Unsworth has humbly accepted the role as the Board's new treasurer.

The year also started with a transition from the Western Massachusetts Regional Library System (WMRLS) to the state-wide Massachusetts Library System (MLS). A number of the staff attended workshops provided by MLS, some of which were hosted here in the Lee Library. MLS also started working with Optima for delivery of inter-library loans. There were some growing pains in the beginning, but things are working smoothly now.

Over the course of the year, the library circulated 34,499 items, of which 26,832 were adult and 7,667 were children's. The library also received 8,477 items from other libraries, and sent 3,266 items to other libraries. The library owns 51,376 items and has 3,047 registered borrowers.

"Go Green @ Your Library" was the theme for the annual Summer Reading Program, and it was a continued success! There were a total of 209 participants, 147 children and 62 adults, who read 2,999 books over the course of the six-week program, a significant increase from the prior year. The program ended with performances by Jay Mankita and Richard Clark.

CreativeLEE X opened in the Gallery on September 24th, and the exhibit was once again well received. Leo Mahoney generously donated his time to edit the video to be shown on CTSB-TV. This yearly partnership has lead to wonderful feedback and publicity for the library.

The year ended with the challenge of a faulty air-conditioning unit, which resulted in the library having to close due to excessive heat over the summer. Temporary patches were put into place, but the main system will have to be fixed to prevent further closures.

Memorial donations were received this year remembering Dorothy C. Mortensen, Barbara S. Henry, Janet M. Seip, Richard Blache, Bill Noonan, and Bill Derrick.

The Board of Directors is composed of President Mary Philpott; Vice-President Judy Nardacci; Treasurer Tom Unsworth; Clerk Sheila Viale, and members Barbara Allen, Dolores Birch, Tom Consolati, Zoe Dalheim, Sharon Delorme, Sandy Hayes, Deborah Maroney, and D. Lynn Shaw.

#### **T**o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The Lee Land Trust, established in 1992, is a non-profit organization of Lee citizens that works to obtain, protect, and preserve open land, both public and private. The Officers and Board of Directors meet once a month (except July and August) to review both ongoing and possible future projects that involve gifts, uses, challenges, and funding sources to accomplish our goals, the latter often require working in conjunction with local, state, and federal organizations. Our annual request and/or renewal for membership was mailed in April, 2011.

This year, 2011, has been particularly active and upbeat! After an anxious wait for over a year, the Land Trust has been awarded a grant of about \$137,000 from the Scenic Byway Federal Grant Program, with help from the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission. Our goal is the completion of a one and a half mile loop trail through Lee Land Trust property in conjunction with the Trustees of Reservations. At this point, designer Peter Jenssen and his crew are working to complete the trail by the end of 2012. The project is located off Route 20 in East Lee, also called the Jacob's Ladder Trail Scenic Byway. It's in our own backyard and we're excited to have such a fine project to present to the public.

During the year, the Land Trust Board has invited speakers to open meetings. In March, John Philpott, formerly with Schweitzer Mauduit paper corporation, spoke to us about future options for land on Golden Hill which local farmers and interested citizens want to save for open space/agricultural use. Our hope is that negotiations will enable the purchase of the land by local groups in order to preserve it for other than "development" or "business."

In May, Roberto Laurens, Farm Manager for High Lawn Farm, spoke at our Open Meeting about the Farm today and plans for the future. These included removing damaged or dead trees to enable everyone to enjoy spectacular views, and replacing many of the trees with native species; maintaining quality care for livestock, land, and expanding the sale of dairy products, and returning the property to a model farm of the 1860s.

Usually Land Trust members clean and prepare the Lee beach for eager summer swimmers and picnickers (as well as sunbathers!). Unfortunately our "usual" afternoon with rakes, shovels, pails, and weeding tools was washed out by bad weather!

Each year, the Lee Land Trust awards a Scholarship to a member of the senior Lee High School class who, according to the Science teacher, has excelled in sci-

ence and/or related fields (environment, ecology, etc.). This year's award went to Melyssa Weiner who is attending the University of Massachusetts in Dartmouth, MA. A Certificate Award and check will be given to Melyssa at our January meeting.

On December 12, a monitoring walk was held on part of the Oak 'N' Spruce property on Beartown Mountain in South Lee for which the Land Trust is Steward. The walk, conducted by Doug Bruce of Berkshire Natural Resources Council, was to determine any damage to trees or plant life and paths, or any trash; this would be reported to Silverleaf, owners of Oak 'N' Spruce, for correction.

New brochures were designed and sent out in our April membership mailing.

## LEE YOUTH ASSOCIATION

The Lee Youth Association continues to provide programming geared towards working families and their children in Lee and surrounding communities. We open at 6:30 A.M. with three "Wake-Up" programs – preschool, Grade K-2 and Grades 3 and up. Breakfast is available to all of our morning children.

We have two After School programs held at the Lee Elementary School. They begin immediately following school and run until 5:30. One is for Grades 3-6 and focuses on Homework Help – the other is for Grades K-2 and focuses on crafts, games and fun! Both are licensed by the Massachusetts Department of Early Education and Care and both help families who work past 3:00 and don't want their children home alone.

Our Busy Bee Preschool is open at the LYA from 6:30 - 5:30. It is a nationally accredited and state licensed program. We always have a waiting list so get your names in early if you are interested. The program is for children who are 2 years, 9 months to 5 years old.

For athletics, we run the youth house league basketball program for children in pre-k to grade 8. We also field 5 travel teams who play in tournaments all over Berkshire County. We run 2 youth baseball programs, T-Ball and Rookie League Baseball, and the girl's softball program. Together with the school we run yoga and gymnastics programs. We also run a young adults' basketball program (ages 18-27). We will be exploring the possibility of offering Lacrosse this spring.

In June, July and August we run our Summer Preschool Program and Summer Adventures Day Camp - both run out of the LYA Building. The Summer Adventures Camp offers not only Arts, Crafts, Games, Sports and Beach Trips but also has Field Trips to the Butterfly Museum, Berkshire Museum, the Zoo at Forest Park, Lupa Zoo, Children's Museum in Holyoke, Hancock Shaker Village and more.

This year we started a new Summer Program by moving our Athletic Field Program to the Lee Elementary School. The new "Summer Rec" program was extremely popular and consisted of sports, arts, crafts and games as well as special events such as a travelling planetarium visit, a visit from Wanderer the snake, a face painting artist, animal balloon making workshop and more. This is just one more program being offered by the LYA and the Lee Public Schools collaboratively as we work to expand programming that will benefit the youth and families in our community.

We have expanded Teen Programming to include different types of programming which provide new and exiting opportunities for our youth. Currently we offer After School Teen Drop In at the LYA and After School Open Gym at Crossways

Village. We started several new programs including a Fitness Program with Lenox Fitness, Horseback Riding Lessons with Aspinwall Equestrian Center, Job Training Workshops with several local businesses, banks and Lee Middle and High School. We began a program called "Touring Berkshire Mansions" which allows students to see the inside of some of the most beautiful and historic buildings in this area as well as expanding their knowledge of the people who lived here so long ago. We also continue to provide field trips including a Paint Ball Trip over vacation. This past spring we held a Health Fair at LMHS and plan on holding a Job Fair at LMHS this spring to help students learn about different job training and career opportunities that they might be interested in exploring.

Aside from all of the programming that we offer, we run 2 Children's Consignment Sales, an Old Fashioned Community Barbecue and Golf Tournament both with the Kiwanis Club of Lee and participate in the Memorial Day Parade, Memorial Day Picnic with the Toole Agency, Halloween Costume Contest with the Spectrum Playhouse and hold a Founder's Day Open House at the LYA. We held our First Annual Gala at the Elm Court Mansion in Lenox – the night was beautiful as we all travelled back to the Gilded Age for a magical evening of dining and dancing.

## PLANNING BOARD

**D**uring the year June 30, 2010 to July 1, 2011, the Lee Planning Board acted upon two (2) Form A Applications (Plans Not Requiring Approval under the Subdivision Control Law) all two were approved. The Board also made decisions concerning six (6) Special Permit Applications five applications for Special Permit were approved and one (1) application was withdrawn without prejudice. The Planning Board reviewed all applications for permanent signs. Several site plans were also brought before the Board for hearing and comment.

The Board worked on developing a Wind Energy Facilities Bylaw. The Board endorsed the bylaw on April 25, 2011 and it was later accepted at the Town Meeting in May.

The Board reviewed a site plan for the redevelopment of the former "Diesel Dan's" property located at 20 Old Pleasant Street. The Big Y Foods, Inc. constructed a 48,000 sq.ft. retail space (grocery store) with approximately an additional 5,000 sq.ft. retail space with parking.

Thomas Wickham was voted in to serve as Chairman this year replacing David Durante. The Board welcomed their new member Shaun Hall.

## **COMMUNICATIONS CENTER**

**T**o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The State 911 Department considers our Communications Center a regional dispatch because we dispatch for Lee police, fire, and ambulance, as well as for Tyringham fire and police. Because the Communication Center serves multiple agencies, we applied for and received our third State 911 Department Incentive Grant. Last year we received \$131,466 in grant funding, and this year we received an additional \$148,512. Using this funding, improvements were made to the main radio console and the fire alarm notification system. In addition, additional radio equipment was purchased to replace or upgrade equipment for the police, fire and ambulance departments as well as Tyringham Fire Department and Tyringham Police Department.

With their communication duties, video and audio security monitoring of locations within the Town Hall, prisoner suicide prevention duties, Elder Well Being Check Program and the myriad of other services they provide, the Communications Center continues to be an invaluable resource to both emergency service providers and the community.

I would like to thank the dispatchers for their continued professionalism in what can sometimes be a very difficult job under stressful circumstances. I would especially like to thank Dispatch Supervisor Donna Tyer for her continued assistance.

## SANDY BEACH COMMITTEE

**D**ear Board of Selectmen,

Herewith is the report of the Sandy Beach Committee for the year 2010-11.

We are grateful for the opportunity to update townspeople about their beach and to let them know that we are grateful for their support through their tax dollars. We use these monies as cautiously as we can and do our best to provide "a peaceful, eye-pleasing and safe setting for families to enjoy recreation and nature." We are grateful to all town officials who have supported our goal not only during the summer but in the past.

A cut of \$3,000 to our operating budget eliminated some of the hand-pulling of weeds, always a safety issue. We are planning to request the restoration of this sum at the next annual town meeting.

Under directives from Laurel Lake Water Power, owner of the dam and a portion of the road to the beach, we shortened our hours to 10 am until a half hour after sunset on the dot. The operations manager was required to open the gate no earlier than lo am. Beachgoers and staff sometimes found it stressful to have to be so punctual. The Committee also purchased speed bumps for the dam owner's use. Dave Duquette of the Planning Board also donated two more. Beachgoers commented upon the obstacles placed by the owner along the road, which required focused navigating in order to reach the parking lot. Beachgoers were also discouraged from walking in to visit the beach after the gate had closed, despite the many-years-old use of the property. Despite that, the numbers of attendees during the day and early evening was roughly the same as the previous year.

The beach also hosted the lively annual party of the Lee Fire Company, and a relaxing picnic sponsored by members of the First Congregational Church. Many birthdays and reunions were celebrated in the grove, as usual.

The amount of time necessary to get the beach up and running during the year 2010-11 was compressed into a shorter period of time. Telephone and electricity wires were taken down in order to build a new house at the dam and were not restored until the final days of June. Luckily, cell phones were used for keeping the beachgoers safe, although the High Lawn Farm chocolate milk served to Lee children on opening day could not be refrigerated. The operations manager was unable to use power tools in order to expedite the work of the jail crew from the House of Correction, however the crew performed their usual high quality repairs in good spirits. Our thanks goes to Sheriff Carmen Massimiano and his able sergeant, John Salvie, the director of the crew, for coming to the beach for their 23rd consecutive year. Their work is always "a job well done." The police detail that for two years had supervised the parking lot against overcrowding and had checked passes, was not

available due to a cutback in funds. Rick Chrisman of the Beach Committee was appointed liaison to the owner of the dam and company, Laurel Lake Water Power.

Swimming lessons were taught to approximately 50 Lee children by "Lee's Own" Megan Streeter, the managing guard. Other lifeguards assisted her. They performed their work excellently and pulled together as a team. They were: Katie Barnoski of Lenox and Cassie Lillie of Pittsfield. Groundskeeper was Dmitri Consolati. Lifeguard substitutes were Ben Kline and long-time staff members and highly qualified personnel, Steve Laurin and Jeanne Laurin Schnackenberg. Beach operations were handled by another long-time staff member, Ed Handberg.

There were no serious accidents at the beach or alcohol abuses.

During the previous winter the board of selectmen convened a committee to consider the viability of moving the Lee beach to the Lenox side of the lake, where the two towns jointly own a piece of property called Edith Wharton Park. Due to the sensitive nature of the proposal (the Lee beach had been in operation at that spot for 80 years) some of the parties could not reach an agreement and the committee disbanded.

The beach chairman answered to a charge of violating an no-trespassing order issued by the dam owner and paid a fine of \$50. in district court in Great Barrington.

Next year we hope to see an increase in the number of latino families from Lee at the beach and we also hope that the Lee Youth Association will consider bringing Lee children to the beach, as they used to do. Their presence is missed.

Our gratitude for a another beautiful season goes to Mr. William Wilde, family member and administrator of High Lawn Farm and Roberto Laurens, manager, for the seasonal use of their renowned property; to Laurel Lake Water Power for the road approach to the beach; to Carmen Massimiano and the Community Work Crew of the county jail and crew chief Sgt. John Salvie for outstanding work; to town officials and representatives and committees, particularly the Lee Highway Department under the direction of Chris Pompi for their care; to Golden Hill Nursery for lovely flowers; to the Lee Kiwanis for their annual cleanup of the grove; to volunteers Paul Cysz and Dmitri Consolati for drainage work; to Lissa Peirce and Lynn Amaral for help with flower gardens, and to other businesses and other people who have contributed to the beach in large or small ways. We could not have such a pretty asset to our town without your help.

# SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS 2010-2011

Lee is clearly a community that respects its past, appreciates its present and embraces the challenges of its future. Lee's sense of history and sense of self makes Lee a special place to work and to educate. I respectfully submit this report on the Lee Public Schools, and the 821 students we served during the 2010-2011 school year.

The Lee Public Schools has a proud and lengthy tradition of service to the students of Lee and surrounding communities through partnerships and programs with many organizations in our community and beyond including:

- The Lee Youth Association
- The Lee Fund for Educational Enrichment
- St. Mary's Elementary School
- The Lee Library
- The Berkshire Theatre Festival
- Shakespeare and Company
- The Flying Cloud Institute
- The Berkshire Compact
- The Lee Community Tennis Association
- The Days in the Arts Program/The BSO
- The Lee Community Development Corporation.

These and many other wonderful organizations, businesses and individuals within our community make learning more meaningful for our students. It is through these types of efforts that we can broaden the horizons of our students, and enrich their educational experiences and opportunities.

We are particularly grateful to the Town of Lee, and all of the employees and board members that keep our community safe, clean and well run; and to the citizens of Lee who support our schools in so many ways—financial and otherwise. To all of you we say, "Thank you."

Through the work of several staff members and administrators the Lee Public Schools created and enacted an anti-bullying policy. The *Commonwealth's Act to Prevent Bullying* requires all public school districts to focus their efforts on preventing bullying, and the consequences, both short and long term, of bullying. We believe students cannot learn to their full potential if they do not feel safe and comfortable in their school. Our policy, adopted by the Lee School early in 2011, addresses all aspects of the state law, and codifies the efforts that we make collaboratively with families and the Lee Police to ensure our students have a safe, comfortable place to call their academichome. Per the *No Child Left Behind Act*, as a district the Lee Public Schools once again made adequate yearly progress (AYP), the measure by which the state and federal governments determine if we are appropriately moving forward. While our schools struggle with making AYP in all grades and for all subgroups of students, we continue to see very positive progress in the Commonwealth's measure of individual student growth.

We certainly see the need to address deficiencies in student performance. Through a combination of better and more frequent formative measures over the course of the school year, improved teacher development, the creation of new interventions to aid students in skill acquisition, and other measures, we are confident that we will continue to strengthen our academic performance and outcomes.

Our staff and administration work collaboratively and with gusto to better develop our abilities as individuals, as schools and as a district. We engage in a wide variety of professional development activities including locally run workshops to formal educational opportunities through county wide efforts with MCLA and BCC, to statewide trainings and meetings. Many of our staff members are students in their own right, working on degrees and courses from a multitude of institutions. We are an educational community dedicated to excellence and to continuous improvement. Likewise, we understand that student performance is a function of family and school, and that great teaching leads to great outcomes for students.

Several educators retired at the end of the 2010-2011 school year. While retirement is always seen as a bittersweet event—we wish all of these educators all of the best as they pursue the interests and family time that can be so elusive during years of public service. Our retirees included Deborah Maroney, Robert Dickson, Timothy Hickey, and Jeanne Randorf from Lee Middle and High School. Susan Horsford and Marie Gormalley retired from Lee Elementary School. Renette Petersoli retired from LES cafeteria. Each of these good people served students in their own way, and with their own special touch. Each enriched our school community in different ways, and we wish them all the best, and offer great thanks for the learning, laughs and experiences they leave us with. We will never be quite the same without them.

During the 2010-2011 school year we undertook the work of creating a comprehensive, long term strategic plan. Through the expert facilitation of consultant John Aherne, Ed.D., a group of 35 community participants were able to complete a mission statement, a statement of our vision and a plan for making our schools better places for learning and teaching.

The Lee Public School Strategic Plan establishes a long-range direction for the district and provides a clear focus for future pursuits by identifying priorities for improvement. This strategic plan is the culmination of analysis and work by a strategic planning committee consisting of teachers, administrators, parents, students, school committee members, and community leaders.

Strategic Planning is a process for creating an organization's preferred future. It is a long-range planning process for organizational renewal and transformation which provides a framework for improving programs, management functions, and evaluation of an organization's progress. Strategic planning helps organizations think and act strategically, develop effective strategies, clarify future directions, establish priorities, improve organizational performance, build teamwork and expertise, and deal effectively with a rapidly changing environment. Our strategic plan is centered on the following strategic goals:

- Curriculum To provide an enriched, diverse, and relevant curriculum that meets the needs of all students
- Technology To employ a variety of technologies as integral components of district curricula, administrative operations, and community partnerships
- Community Collaboration To develop and nurture dynamic, mutually beneficial partnerships with the greater community
- Teaching and Learning To maximize student achievement by utilizing effective teaching that challenges and meets the needs of all learners
- Student Wellness To create an atmosphere that results in social, emotional, physical, and academic health for all students

While the plan is complete, the action steps to carry out the plan over the long term continue to be work in progress. We do, however, filter every decision through two key notions: 1) is it in the best interest of children and 2) does it meet the spirit and outcomes identified in the plan. ## LEE MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL

 $\mathbf{I}$ t is my privilege to submit the report for the 2010-2011 school year to the community of Lee.

#### Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS)

We hold MCAS preparation as an important responsibility for students in grades seven through twelve. Our programs and efforts focus on the MCAS preparation and as necessary, MCAS remediation. We strive to help students earn scores to ensure graduation with an eye on first-time passes in English language arts, mathematics and biology for all sophomores. We proudly report that the members of the graduating Class of 2011 worked diligently to meet these MCAS standards and earn competency determination in all three of these subject areas.

#### **Student Activities**

LMHS students continued to work hard in extracurricular activities to benefit our school and community. At the high school level they were involved in service through our chapter of National Honor Society, Student Council, and Helping Hands. Honor Society students staffed the Lee Youth Association's consignment sale and also tutored their peers through the Homework Help program. Student volunteers delivered food to the Lee Food Pantry, walked in Construct's annual fall Walk for the Homeless and hosted a blood drive sponsored by the American Red Cross. Members of Helping Hands campaigned for safety and awareness during the holidays, and the prom and graduation season. Lee Middle School students again participated in a number of activities such as newspaper, middle-level yearbook, and junior varsity sports.

#### Fine and Performing Arts

#### Visual Arts

Though funding from the MA Cultural Council, the art department partnered with sculptor Ann Jon to bring the new STARS Residencies school grant program to LMHS. 8th graders explored stone carving, and in her role as Executive Director of Sculpture Now, Ms. Jon arranged a tour of Stockbridge for high school students to view sculptures displayed at several locations throughout the town. High school art students then created their own metal welded sculptures which are on display in our east side courtyard. Mrs. Lola Jaffe, a generous member of our community, sponsored 2 trips to New York City for 32 high school students to see a Broadway matinee and a museum exhibit. Finally, we hung the 16th Annual LMHS Art Exhibition in the Lobby of the Henry T. Zukowski Performing Arts Center. Art students from both the middle and high school proudly displayed their works of creativity.

#### **Dramatics**

The members of the 2010-2011 Drama Club were involved in two performances this year. In the fall, we collaborated with Shakespeare and Co. to present Cymbelene. Our musical this past year was Aladdin, a Chinese theater version, which allowed the students to participate in Chinese New Year, take classes in yoga, and get to know the culture, customs, and theater style of another culture. The Drama Club also sponsored a Halloween dance and participated in The Winter Wonderland Bash in conjunction with Joanne Nelson-Unczur and both Jazz and Concert bands at LMHS. Seniors were awarded the Drama Clubs' annual scholarship as part of graduation activities and Benjamin Hover received the Michael P. Quinlan Memorial Drama Scholarship.

#### Music

The Lee Middle and High School Music department had an exciting school year in 2010-2011.

Middle School Chorus was in their 3rd year. Approximately 40 students participated in two concerts at the school as well as a mini-concert tour to local nursing homes.

The bands performed their annual Winter Holiday concerts, Winter "Prism" Concert which featured every music student in a chamber ensemble, a spring concert, Class of 2011 graduation exercises, Lee Founders' Day Parade, Memorial Day Parade, and several home football games.

The High School Band commissioned a new work by the composer Steve Bathory-Peeler. The composer wrote the band a new work and visited the school to work with students on his piece. The Lee High School Band gave the first performance of "Locomotion" on May 4, 2011.

The Lee Middle School Band won a gold rating at the Great East Music Festival in May 2011. Several students participated in the Western District Music Festival: Ali Wickham, Jeff Brown, Michael Roosa: Junior District Band; Jordan Miller: Junior District Orchestra; Sadie Clouser, Dan O'Brien: Junior District Chorus; Sara Fitzhugh: Senior District Band; Kyle Murray: Senior District Jazz Band; Katrina Snow and Megan Martin: Senior District Chorus.

More than 20 students participated in the after school high school chorus program.

#### **Athletics**

During the 2010-2011 school year at Lee Middle and High School a large number of students continued to enjoy success, camaraderie, and character building through athletics. Close to 50% of our student body competed on eleven varsity, nine junior varsity and/or five cooperative teams.

During the fall, the golf team finished the regular season with an 8-6 record and qualified for the Western Mass Tournament. The girls' soccer team had a record of 8-8-2 and qualified for the Western Mass Tournament. The boys' soccer team also qualified for the tournament. The volleyball team had a very successful season with a record of 12-7, and played in the Western Mass Tournament. The football team finished a very successful season at 7-3.

In the winter, the boys' basketball team had a record of 11-9 in the regular season, before losing in the quarter finals to the eventual champions. The girls' basketball team was 24-2 making it all the way to the state finals, and the Lady Wildcats were the Division III Western Massachusetts Champions for an unprecedented nineteenth time. We also had students participating in cooperative teams with neighboring schools in wrestling, hockey, swimming and skiing.

In the spring, the boys' tennis team went through the regular season undefeated with a record of 14-0, and for the first time making it to the finals in the Western Mass Tournament. The girl's tennis team qualified for the Western Mass tournament with a regular season record of 9-7. The girls' softball team finished the season with a very respectable record of 8-12. The baseball teams' record was only 1-19 but there is a core group of underclassman that had a winning JV record in baseball. We also sent 15 students to participate in track and field.

#### **Academic Teams**

The Lee Middle and High School Quiz Team began its 2010-2011 season in October by hosting the first match. In addition to Lee, the participating schools for this season were Taconic High School, Lenox Memorial Middle and High School, Pittsfield High School, Wahconah Regional High School, St. Joseph High School, and Monument Mountain Regional High School. Members of Lee's team were very active in this years' competitions. We regularly had between 15 and 20 students participating - the largest amount of students from any of the schools.

Lee Middle and High School students also competed in the Massachusetts Academic Decathlon. The theme for the 2010-2011 competition focused on the Great Depression and the book The Grapes of Wrath by John Steinbeck. Members of the decathlon team were Stephanie Passetto, Oscar Courchaine, Joshua Koch, Amanda Fraser, Ashley Somerville, Craig Slater, Laurel Martinell, and Maite Melendez.

Lee Middle and High School's TV Team had a short run in the TV program "As Schools Match Wits." Members of the Lee team were Patrick Holmes, Tara Giarolo, Colin Abderhalden and Craig Slater. The coaches for the three academic teams were Joshua Hall and Keri Wade.

Rounding out the academic competition was the Mock Trial Team, who competed against Westfield High School, Lenox High School, and Southwick-Tolland Regional High School. As always, the team worked very hard. This years' case dealt with involuntary vehicular death due to a high school's senior scavenger hunt. The matches this year were very close. Many of the new members of the team had excellent results for the work and effort they exhibited. The Lee team members were Joshua Koch, Daniel O'Brien, Katherine Cortes, Margaret Harding, Emily Diaz, Alexander Lindsay, Antonella Jimenez, Maite Melendez, Jack Harding, and Luke Williams. The coaches for this team were Joshua Hall and Keri Wade.

## LEE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

**I**t is my pleasure to report to you as I begin a second year as Principal of Lee Elementary School.

We bid a fond adieu and wish very happy, healthy retirements to Mrs. Susan Horsford, our Title 1 teacher, and Mrs. Marie Gormalley, a first grade teacher. We will miss them all!

Due to the loss of two full time teaching positions as a result of budget constraints, (one in our 5th grade and one in our 6th grade), we have found it necessary to reconfigure many of our staff members at LES for the 2011-2012 school year. I must express with confidence that this team of teachers and paraprofessionals at LES will absorb the loss of two teaching positions in a most commendable fashion. There will be the following staff changes for the upcoming year:

- Carrie St. John is now teaching 2nd Grade.
- Leslie Hickey is now teaching 4th Grade.
- Sue Turner is now our Title I service provider.
- Michele Puleri is now solely an English and Math teacher for Grade 5 as Lauren Finnegan is for Grade 6. Tom Finnegan is teaching all the Social Studies classes for Grades 5 and 6 (with one math) as Paula Duhon is teaching all the Science (also with one math). All teachers are also teaching their own Written Expression classes. Teachers at the 5/6 levels have created Inquiry classes for the students to rotate through this year as well. They have developed classes to meet two days per week in Green Engineering, Elementary Financing, Character Education, and Study Skills. Chorus is also being offered at this time as well as a remedial math class.

#### **Curriculum and Instruction Work**

We continued working with consultants to improve reading, writing, and math instruction through June of 2011. That has enabled us to work specifically on improvement of reading centers within our classrooms, use more writing in math class to increase understanding, and utilization of many more manipulatives to ensure a more conceptual understanding of math. We have worked very hard and will begin the year with many assessments of reading and math in place to identify specifically where children's learning needs are and developing of interventions to help them succeed.

The new school year will bring with it a most urgent need to align our English Language Arts and Math curriculum documents to reflect the new Common Core Standards that Massachusetts has adopted in these areas. Our staff will spend much professional develop-

ment time updating curriculum materials and aligning instruction to meet the changing demands from the state. A focus for our time together across the district will be an emphasis on reading in the content areas and the understanding of non-fiction texts. We are charged with having children ready to take newly-aligned tests in the spring of 2014!

Professional development plans are made with input from the district Strategic Planning Teams in mind. They will be making recommendations to the administration and the School Committee in the areas of Curriculum, Teaching and Learning, Technology, Student Wellness, and Community Collaboration. Much energy is pointed toward improvement in all these areas. Input for planning is also gathered from the LES Department Heads which have been established in the areas of Math, English Language Arts, Science, Social Studies, Accommodations (the providing of Special Education), and Learning and Personal Growth (specialist areas such as music, art, PE, and library). This team carried out curriculum endeavors that established where we are with each subject area, where we need to coordinate efforts at LES and within the district, what materials we have and those we may need, as well as moving Common Core alignment forward from the minute the standards came out in the spring. These teacher leaders wisely advise the principal about how to best accomplish work to improve curriculum and instruction here at LES.

#### **Other Exciting Events**

LES regularly holds monthly assemblies called "Gatherings". The Gathering time is used to acknowledge student efforts and achievements, share the conditions from the Aspirations program and anti-bullying curricula, introduce school wide initiatives, give classes a "Chance to Shine" and share curriculum they are working on, and, of course, encourage music and the arts in the school. Some "Chances to Shine" in the past year included an adventure poem, a multiplication game demonstration, a water cycle song, a chant about heritage, and a division rap.

The Sixth grade students are raising money for an African village and a Pennies for Patients- type activity (or other worthy cause through Student Council), but many fundraising efforts are aimed at in-house programs in these tougher economic times. For example, the kids continue to recycle juice pouches and snack wrappers to help with the robotics team described below. Additionally, 5th and 6th grade students gave of their time to regularly visit with residents of the Laurel Lake Center for Health and Rehabilitation. Student Council also had some great ideas for contributing to the community again this year.

As always, we offered and will be offering several opportunities for students to participate in extra-curricular activities. Students were able to get involved in the news-

paper, Student Council, maple sugaring, drama, physical fitness and sports clubs, band, the Special Olympics, and chorus.

LES students made many field trips throughout the school year and we are making an effort to bring in enriching programming for students especially in the areas of Social Studies, nutrition and wellness, and music. Field trip destinations included Ioka Valley Farm, Plimouth Plantation, Boston Museum of Science, and William's College, to name a few. We would like to extend a very special thank you to our wonderful PTO for helping out with the costs of buses and/or admission prices of many of our field trips and funding for the wonderful programs we are able to host!
