## Answers to several key questions

Who is covered by the bylaws? Anyone who provides goods – including food and/or beverages – directly to consumers, with or without charge. This includes sporadic (even single-event), temporary, part- or full-time operations that are commercial, non-profit, religious, educational, foundation-related, or governmental, regardless of where they are.

What kinds of bags might I get when I go shopping? Bringing your own bags is best. At check-out, establishments will have the option of providing (possibly for a price) recyclable paper bags, cardboard boxes, and/or reusable shopping bags that should be large, strong, thick, washable, and made of natural fibers (such as cotton or linen) or a durable, non-toxic, food-grade plastic. For bulk items, you'll get either paper bags or compostable plastic bags.

Do the bylaws get rid of all plastic bags? No. There will still be bags for newspapers, dry cleaning, and many products. And you'll be able to purchase packaged plastic bags as you might do now.

What will take the place of polystyrene containers? Options range from traditional materials like cardboard and aluminum foil to newer, compostable ones made from natural fibers like straw, corn, or sugar cane residue. And, while not covered by the bylaws, in many cases you'll be able to bring your own drink or food containers.

#### SUMMARY OF THE PLASTIC BAG AND POLYSTYRENE BYLAWS ADOPTED AT THE 2016 TOWN MEETING

- No more free, thin-film shopping bags and no more polystyrene drink and food containers.
- For long-term savings, to help Lee be greener and cleaner, and to support local establishments, please use only reusable bags and containers. You can start now: supermarkets sell reusable bags, a few banks give them away, and several downtown merchants (Carr Hardware, Karen Keenan's, Lee Hardware, Paperdilly, and Zabian's) and the Outlets sell the Committee's bags.

The May 2016 Town Meeting adopted bylaws regulating the use of thin-film, plastic shopping bags and polystyrene drink and food containers. The goal was to reduce adverse impacts and to make Lee more sustainable and attractive to residents, tourists, and businesses. The bylaws require those providing food, drinks, and goods that have not already stopped using the regulated items to use different products. The key provisions for consumers are summarized below.

<ul> <li>Participants in the WIC or SNAP programs and non-profits or charities that distribute goods to clients do not have to pay for recyclable paper bags or, at the establishment's discretion, reusable bags.</li> <li>Non-profits and charities that distribute goods to clients are exempt.</li> <li>Consumers may purchase plastic bags contained in packages of multiple units intended for personal use.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Consumers may purchase pre-packaged food and drink containers made of polystyrene for their personal use.</li> <li>Food or drinks prepared or packaged outside of Lee are exempt.</li> </ul>
<b>Enforcement:</b> consumers may file with the Tri-Town Health Department	Enforcement: consumers may file complaints of non-compliance by
