

BOARD OF SELECTMEN & TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

Notwithstanding the international financial crisis which unfolded in the fall of 2008, shortly after the start of fiscal year (FY) 2009, the Town of Lee weathered the onset of the "Great Recession" without reducing services. Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funding compensated for state aid reductions and robust new growth offset some of the Town of Lee's FY 2009 increased operating expense. Nevertheless, higher operating costs and a continued shift of the tax burden from commercial/industrial to residential property tax payers resulted in a \$139 increase in the average single family tax burden. Following the closings of four of our five paper mills during the prior fiscal year, the "Great Recession" is an added obstacle to our efforts to promote the reuse of the mills and a challenge to our ability to maintain services.

The principal state-aid accounts decreased from FY 2008 to FY 2009 by \$103,321 or 3.9 %. The state offset that reduction by allocating to the town for education \$217,444 of federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funding which resulted in a net increase of \$114,123 or 4.3%. State Chapter 70 aid for education decreased by \$27,791, but the dedicated \$217,444 ARRA funding resulted in a net increase of \$189,653 or 10%. In addition to those state and federal education funds totaling \$2,067,656, the town received tuition from other towns in the school district and payments from municipalities outside the district whose students chose to be educated in Lee public schools. Tuition from other towns in the district increased by \$17,299. Moreover, payments to outside districts for Lee students attending their schools decreased by \$29,148. Consequently, the favorable difference between CHOICE receipts and payments increased from \$303,381 in FY2008 to a decade high \$349,948 in FY2009.

Both unrestricted state aid and local receipts for general government decreased from FY2008 to FY2009. In mid FY2009, unrestricted state aid was reduced by \$75,530 or 9.7% to \$699,568, a level of aid only slightly higher than the amount received in FY2006. The trend in reduced local receipts which started in FY2008 continued in FY2009, but at more than double the rate of decline. Led by reduced investment income, fees and room occupancy excise, local receipts decreased by \$286,710 to \$1,795,252, or by 13.8%. By comparison local receipts in FY2008 decreased by \$137,970 or 6.2%.

In addition to federal ARRA funding, robust growth in the real and personnel property tax base helped to lessen the affect of reduced state and local receipts. New growth in residential valuation of \$10,519,683 and personal property

valuation of \$10,458,240 were the main contributors to the \$391,000 increase in the property tax levy base in FY 2009.

The total operating budget increased from \$17,981,518 in FY2008 to \$18,814,594 in FY2009 or by \$833,576 (4.6%). Excluding those expenditures and the other expenses that are funded by sewer, water, and ambulance fees, the property taxpayer-supported operating budget increased from \$14,668,843 to \$15,413,838 or by \$744,995 (5%). About three quarters (\$548,402) of that increase was in the School Department budget, because of additional special education costs (\$484,504) and a correction for over-reliance on CHOICE receipts (\$71,000). While the School Department's Choice receipts of \$728,036 in FY2008 permitted it to commit \$725,000 of that funding toward its FY2009 operating budget, that amount was less than the \$796,000 Choice commitment in FY2008.

The Town's 75% share of its school and municipal employees' health insurance premiums rose by \$44,130 or 2.1 %. In response to its FY2008 deficit, the snow and ice management budget was increased by nearly \$43,500 or 15%. Energy line items were increased to reflect the rapid rise in supply costs in FY 2008. Municipal wages and salaries increased by 2.5%, a cost of living adjustment slightly more than the 2.3% adjustment accorded retirees on January 1, 2008. In addition, a merit step system modeled after the school teachers twelve step longevity plan was introduced for non-union municipal employees, except the Town Administrator. While additional hours for the Treasurer also increased personnel expense, one senior management position, Principal Assessor, was eliminated through outsourcing. Other offsets included a \$60,000 reduction in debt service expense and a nearly \$4,500 reduction in insurance.

In FY2009 the full-time municipal staff remained unchanged except for the retirement of long serving police officer James Loring. In October 2008 he was replaced by Lee resident Ryan Lucy. There was also one change in the regular part-time staff. Long-serving Gas and Plumbing Inspector Paul Jakacky retired in October and in December 2008 he was replaced by Jason Dion. The Ambulance Service continued to evolve as a paid service, because of a lack of weekday volunteers to respond to early morning and late afternoon calls. The workday for Intermediate Emergency Medical Technician (EMT-I) Kevin Palmer and EMT/Custodian Matt Tyer was extended to twelve hours and their workweek was reduced to three and one-third days. To cover the balance of the expanded (from 40 to 60 hours) paid workweek, Intermediate EMTs Crystal VanDeusen and Jessie Briggs and EMT/Custodian Erica Bulshey were hired. To grow the shrinking volunteer corps, the ambulance building was certified as an EMS training facility through the efforts of Vicki Sorrentino and Scott Rockerfeller, and an EMT class was offered to seven students.

Richard Neales was appointed to serve as a seasonal truck driver/laborer during the winter of 2008-2009. He also served from June through August, when the Department of Public Works (DPW) was shorthanded due to several extended

medical leaves. In the summer of 2009 Justin Biasin served as seasonal police officer. Scott Abderhalden returned to serve as the Department of Public Works (DPW) engineering intern, and Alek O'Brien returned to serve as a DPW groundskeeper. Joshua Herlihy and Michael Forzano also served as seasonal groundskeepers. Shannon Varasconi, managing lifeguard; Kristie Kiener, senior lifeguard; and, Caleb Tuttle, lifeguard, joined the Sandy Beach staff for the 2009 season. They were accompanied by returning senior lifeguards Katie Barnoski, Megan Streeter and Jeanne Schnackenberg; maintenance/operations person Ed Handberg; and groundskeeper Dmitri Consolati.

Police Officer Craig Desantis was commended for his heroic actions involving the rescue and subsequent medical attention to three victims of a helicopter accident off Tyringham Road on March 10, 2009.

In an effort to contain rising energy costs, the *ad hoc* Energy Efficiency Committee led energy conservation and procurement efforts in FY2009. In the spring of 2009, the committee received energy audits that were funded by a state Department of Energy Resources grant. Energy conservation and clean technology assessments were conducted for the new wastewater treatment plant, Memorial (Town) Hall, the South Lee Fire Station/Post Office Building and the Central Fire Station. Clean technology audits were preformed at Lee Elementary and Lee Middle and High School. Scoping audits to identify shorter term paybacks were performed on the Department of Public Works' Highway Division garage and the Airoldi Building, the municipal office annex. We plan to pursue grant opportunities and utility company rebates to make the recommended conservation measures, and to explore the clean technology opportunities.

Members of the Energy Efficiency Committee served on the *ad hoc* committee that selected a project engineer for the clean technology enhancements at the water treatment plant; and, the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, which had previously selected the plant for its energy pilot program, designated American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funding for our hydroelectric and photovoltaic project. We expect that funding, the design and a construction contract in place by February, 2010. The Energy Efficiency Committee also collaborated on the March 2009, three-year, electricity supply contract for both school and municipal buildings; and, explored the possibility of earning fees by shifting to emergency generators during periods of peak demand for electricity. While energy cost containment was an important part of our effort to avoid current and future service reductions, the revival of our commercial/industrial base, and the associated employment opportunities, was of paramount importance in FY2009.

We retained, at no cost, MassDevelpment, a quasi state agency, to manage the 100,000 state grant that we received at the end of FY2008 for marketing and

expediting local permitting for two, town-meeting-approved development sites, the vacant Eagle and Laurel Mills. MassDevelopment also agreed to apply for additional funding for the mill reuse effort, and working with the Lee Community Development Corporation (CDC) and Berkshire Regional Planning Commission (BRPC), it obtained a \$50,000, matching, Economic Adjustment Assistance grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration. BRPC prepared policies and procedures to expedite local permitting at the designated sites, and we adopted those policies in January 2009. In March 2009, MassDevelopment's grantfunded consultant presented their market and facilities analysis at a mill reuse public forum. While the "Great Recession" has deterred developers, our efforts to market the designated mills are unrelenting.

In FY2009 the Lee CDC continued its efforts to plan for and promote economic development downtown. At the start of the fiscal year, students from the Harvard Graduate School of Design, who had been engaged by the Lee CDC, presented their downtown revitalization concepts at a public forum sponsored by the CDC. In October, a Lee Bike Path Committee was formed to make sure that a planned regional trail does not bypass our town, and the Lee CDC Executive Director, Richard Vinette, Jr., was appointed to the committee to insure that the local spur would promote downtown economic development. In January the Lee CDC led Downtown Economic Revitalization Taskforce presented its draft downtown economic development strategy.

While our attention was also directed to the BRPC Lee Traffic Study, the creation of an Upper Housatonic Area of Critical Environmental Concern, the cleanup of the Housatonic River and access to the Sandy Beach, economic circumstances in FY2009 compelled us to focus on energy cost reduction and economic development opportunities.

We expect that the economy will drive us to maintain that focus next fiscal year.

In closing we would like to thank all of our town employees and volunteers for their service to the community. We are especially grateful for the time and efforts of out fire department and ambulance service volunteers and those who voluntarily serve on town boards, committees and commissions. In particular we extend our thanks to Suzanne Alderman who we each rely on for organizational support and administrative assistance.

TOWN TREASURER

 ${f T}$ o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The Treasurer's office in addition to the normal operations underwent a massive software conversion. Our payables went live on July 1st; the start of the new fiscal year and the payroll went live on January 1, 2009. We are still experiencing transitional bumps but are confident that the benefits of this new system in the long run will improve efficiency of both town and school. I served as the project manager for the implementation process and I believe that all involved felt it was a successful conversion.

I have a total of 505 full and part time employees. The Town of Lee still maintains it's commitment to our employees to educate and encourage them in regards to wellness. The following wellness programs were put on: 6 week Yoga, Health 2009 challenge, Mediterranean cooking series, 8 week winter walking fitness program (twice a week), Strengthening the Immune System seminar, and our annual wellness fair. In conjunction with the Tri-Town Regional Wellness Committee we also offered employee spa days at Cranwell, participated in a health screenings series, and a color your plate challenge.

We currently offer to our employee's health insurance, life insurance, whole and universal insurance, accident and disability insurance, two separate voluntary retirement plans, a flexible spending plan and dental insurance. This requires a lot of management from within our department. To always strive and get the best product and prices most of these are renegotiated each year. We also sell Six Flags reduced tickets.

I manage the Insurance Advisory Committee which consists of the following members: Paul Porrini, Joe Turmel, Betty Leahey, Glenn Withers, Patricia Gray, Mark Hungate, Donna Kresiak, and Craig DeSantis. We only met once during the fiscal year. We continue to purchase our health insurance through MIIA and received a 6% increase in rates. There was no change to the product. We also selected Standard for our life insurance with a 9% decrease and a three year rate guarantee. Guardian provides our dental insurance with a 0% increase. I want to thank each of the members for their participation on this committee.

The following employees retired: Carol Walsh, Debbie Holmes, James Loring, Marge LaGarce, Aniela St. Peter and Marion Clark.

The following retirees past away: Gertrude Ford and Louisa O'Brien. I express my deepest condolences to their families.

As stated above a successful conversion for our general ledger and payroll system to FundSense, a windows based software. In addition we merged the school and town's financial records on one data base and mainframe.

The treasurer's position was increased from 30 hours a week to 35 hours effective 7-1-2008.

I earned \$152,677.00 in investment income.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

T he following is the annual report of the Department of Public Works for the fiscal year 2009 (FY09).

Highway Division

The primary responsibility of the Highway Department is to maintain the Towns highway and bridge infrastructure. This year town employees modified problem drainage areas, patched potholes, landscaped roadsides, and completed a multitude of roadway and bridge maintenance projects.

In addition to the Towns forces, private contractors were retained to place bituminous concrete, and apply crack sealer to various Town roads. The following roads were repaved: Via Franco, Via Bondi, Via Maria, Pine Street, and portions of West Center Street and Tyringham Road. The following roads were crack sealed: Orchard Street, Summer Street and portions of Greylock Street.

The winter season was handled superbly by Highway Supervisor, Dennis Kelly and his crew. They performed with excellence during extremely adverse and tiring conditions. The Town utilized 2,000 tons of salt and countless man hours to provide safe traveling for the public.

Forestry

The DPW continues to receive numerous requests to remove trees. The budget is limited as to the number that can be removed. We prioritize tree removal to those that are of an immanent danger to the public.

Water Division

The Water Department strives to provide all users with excellent water and uninterrupted service. This fiscal year the Water Department finished 265 million gallons of potable water. The Towns Water Supervisor, Mike Towler and his crew continue to maintain, operate, and initiate improvements to the distribution system, storage tanks, treatment plant, reservoirs, access road, and watershed. With the Towns aging water system, these tasks become increasingly difficult. Mike and his crew should be commended on their effort to maintain the system.

Sewer Division

The Sewer Departments primary responsibility is to collect, pump, and treat raw sewage. This fiscal year the Sewer Department treated approximately 280 million gallons of raw sewage. The Towns Waste Water Supervisor, Alan Zerbato and his crew continue to maintain, operate, monitor, and initiate improvements to the collection system, and pump stations. The new Waste Water Treatment Plant is operational and is producing a "quality" effluent. The plant is performing as designed and Al continues to add value to processes.

To offset incurred costs of the new plant, the Sewer Department accepted and treated 1,299,000 gallons of septage. The revenue generated by this undertaking was \$129,000.00

POLICE DEPARTMENT

 ${f T}$ o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

In August 2008 Officer James Loring retired from the police department after 20 years of service. In November 2008, Officer Ryan Lucy was hired as his replacement. Officer Lucy had previously worked for the Great Barrington Police Department.

Motor vehicle accidents were down this year in part as a result of increased traffic enforcement. The enforcement efforts of Officers Jeff Roosa and Ryan Lucy were largely responsible for the high number of citations this year and the reduction in accidents. The enforcement efforts of Officers Adrian Kohlenberger, Craig DeSantis and other officers also contributed to this decline in accidents.

Over the past year, all of our officers did an excellent job doing investigations into burglaries and vandalism. We had a clearance rate of between 80 and 90% for these offenses which is directly attributable to the officer's hard work. As the department has no single officer assigned to detective duties, officers handle their own cases which has resulted in all officers developing exceptional investigative skills.

Officers Jeffrey Roosa and Craig DeSantis continued their participation with the Berkshire County Special Response Team. The cost to the department for their participation is minimal and in turn the officers receive exceptional training at no cost which greatly benefits our department. Officer William Bartini continued his work with the Berkshire County Drug Task Force. His work there is paid for though grant funding and his efforts not only help reduce drug related crimes in Lee but bring us funding from court ordered drug asset forfeitures. Officer Adrian Kohlenberger continued in his valuable role as our School Resource Officer. Sgt. Joseph Buffis, with the help of a computerized traffic analyzer and citizen input, has been working to help reduce the speeding problems in residential areas by assigning directed radar patrol where it is most needed.

I would like to thank all our officers for their investigative and enforcement efforts, and their dedicated service to the community. I would also like to thank Tracy Dunn for her hard work as the police secretary. In addition, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and Town Representatives for their support.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

 ${f T}$ o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Report of the Conservation Commission for Fiscal 2009

In administering the Wetlands Protection Act, Conservation has reviewed eleven Requests for Determination of Applicability and nine Notice of Intent. One of the more controversial Notices presented to us this year was the Laurel Lake Invasive Aquatic Plant Management Plan. In conjunction with the Lenox Conservation, Lee Conservation is trying to determine the best course of action between chemical treatment, drawdowns and weed pulling. Compounding measures has been the recent discovery of Zebra Mussels in the lake and how they can best be contained.

This year the Commission has also invested in GIS (Geographic Information System) for the Massachusetts Conservation Mapping and Partnership Program. GIS integrates hardware, software, and data for capturing, managing, analyzing, and displaying all forms of geographically referenced information. We have been working with Dave Parker in implementing this system to the benefit of other town boards, particularly the assessors.

Conservation has been working with a limited staff and has recently welcomed the addition of Jack Coty. Anyone interested in conservation issues and the impact development has in the environment is urged to join us.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORP.

In 2009 The Lee Community Development Corporation, a private nonprofit economic development organization, continues to be involved in both local and regional economic development issues. The Lee CDC's two successful economic development projects, the Lee Corporate Center, and Quarry Hill Business Park have helped create jobs and economic opportunity in Lee and the region. The Lee CDC also participated significantly in the development and implementation of the Berkshire Blueprint, a regional economic development action plan and continues to work closely with Berkshire Economic Development Corporation to implement that plan and encourage growth, investment and jobs across the region.

During FY 2008 the Lee CDC also continued to provide assistance to the Town in strategic planning for downtown initiatives. The CDC worked with the downtown taskforce and private investors in encouraging development in the downtown area. The CDC sponsored a field study by the Harvard University Graduate School of Design in July 2008. In 2009 the Lee CDC assisted the town in completing preliminary redevelopment planning for the Eagle Mill under a \$100,000 technical assistance grant from the Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development to be used to develop master site plans and expedited permitting for paper mill sites at the Eagle Mill, and the Laurel Mill. In 2009 that grant was supplemented by an additional grant from the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Economic Development Administration.

The Lee CDC also has worked to encourage and facilitate re-development of the Baird-Benton building on Main Street, as well as other locations in the Town. Through its involvement in planning activities and funding strategies for a variety of projects, the CDC continues to promote parking development initiatives on the east side of Main Street and elsewhere in the downtown, and has been in initiatives to encourage development of pedestrian and bike trails and greenways along the Housatonic River.

In 2009 Lee CDC sponsored a number of Community Development Finance Corporation (CDFC) loans to regional companies, including the newly formed Onyx Paper Company. The CDC also led an initiative to create new Economic Opportunity Areas along Route 102 to encourage development.

We wish to thank all of our local and regional supporters and partners in community and economic development and we look forward to 2010's challenges and opportunities.

TRI-TOWN HEALTH DEPARTMENT

 ${f T}$ o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I hereby submit my annual report for the fiscal year 2009

Following is a summary of our Public Health Prevention programs:

<u>Title 5 On-site Wastewater Disposal</u>: Helping homeowners and prospective buyers comply with Title 5 requirements continues to be a daily challenge. We believe that overall the changes to Title 5 were positive and beneficial to the environment. However, we also believe the costs incurred by homeowners for septic system construction and upgrades are still excessive and not affordable to many. In an effort to address this issue the Health Department will be working with our partners in the DEP satellite office to investigate options to reduce costs and maintain the same degree of environmental protection.

In response to the increased demand associated with required continuing education credits for Registered Sanitarians, Septic Installer, Title 5 and Soil Evaluator certifications, this office has sponsored a number of educational programs to meet that demand. These educational activities, not only provide a much needed service to affected members of the community, but also defray our operating costs by generating additional revenue to our member communities.

Food Service Sanitation Program: Community/Special Events where food vendors outside the Tri-Town area, continues to be challenging with respect to confirming permitting and training requirements. To improve on this process, we have reached out to the Event Coordinators and developed a written guide they can follow and disseminate to all food vendors. This has improved overall communication between this office the Event Coordinator and all food vendors. Although we still encounter periodic problems, the overall process is much improved and we will continue our efforts working with the Event Coordinators in providing a safe and healthy environment for the community.

Ice Sampling: The routine ice sampling program has proven to be an excellent environmental tool the Health Department can utilize in gauging the effectiveness of food service sanitation practices. This office can then assist establishments in obtaining the additional educational programs necessary to reinforce proper sanitation practices and reduce the opportunity for food borne illness.

Pool & Spa Monitoring Program: Lloyd Banister "LB", Health Inspector has been doing a great job working with Owners and Certified Pool Operators to

ensure that all public/semi public swimming pools and hot tubs has been successful in improving and maintaining bacteriological quality.

Town Beaches: The Health Department continues to conduct weekly inspection and testing of Town beaches for bacteriological quality. All samples taken were within acceptable levels for bathing beaches. This is due in large part to the efforts of the community beach and recreational committees and volunteers who maintain these facilities.

Regionalization: As communities continue to deal with severe budget constraints, the push for regional efforts grow stronger. State Public Health Commissioner John Auerbach has identified regionalization a priority. The Tri-Town Health Department model has been highlighted in a number of studies and recommended for communities who might consider regional public health programs. As such this office has been invited to participate in a number of statewide initiatives and discussions regarding the benefits of implementing regional models on a statewide basis.

Internship Program: Research shows that over one-fourth of our public health infrastructure will be eligible to retire in the next 3-5 years. In an effort to promote the field and train new people, Kimberly Kelly, Assistant Director, and I have been working in partnership with Berkshire Community College and Massachusetts College to Liberal Arts to initiate a sustainable internship program. Our program includes making internships available to current students interested in the public health field and intrigued recent graduates. Interns will become familiar with any and all aspects of public health including shadowing inspectors during routine inspections; attending field-related trainings; participating in meetings and special interest projects.

<u>Tobacco Awareness Program</u>: The Tobacco Awareness Program is grant funded by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health and provides a variety of tobacco control services for (12) twelve Berkshire County communities. A major part of our scope of service is to conduct Tobacco Retailer Trainings. This year, office staff provided (42) forty-two trainings that educated nearly (550) five-hundred and fifty tobacco retail clerks making our grand total over (1,000) one-thousand.

Kim and I are pleased to announce that preliminary evaluation results from an independent research company, Market Street Research, looked very positive. A more thorough evaluation will be conducted once more results are compiled over the next couple years.

Other grant deliverables include: merchant education; working closely with local housing authorities to institutionalize smoke-free housing for their residents and conducting at least (3) three tobacco compliance checks at every tobacco retailer in the (12) twelve community collaborative. Tobacco sales to minors exponentially

decreased in Fiscal 08 and 09, most likely due to the newly implemented *Youth Access Plan Initiative*. My staff and I have continued our efforts in working with local Boards of Health to reduce the number of tobacco sales to minors and to educate tobacco retail clerks the proper methods in doing so. Several tobacco sub-committee meetings were held and regulations were newly adopted in Great Barrington and Lanesborough. Volunteer compliance has been successfully implemented in O'Connell, Cumberland Farms and XtraMart stores in communities such as Adams, Dalton, North Adams and Williamstown.

Municipal Wellness Grant: In FY 2008, we were awarded \$85,000 from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health to ensure municipal employee health was top priority. The funding was used to hire consultants from Berkshire Health Systems. Roberta Orsi and Jenna Grelle are experts in employee wellness and assisted municipal employees in Lee, Lenox, Stockbridge, Lanesborough and Pittsfield. Some wellness program highlights include: 300 municipal employees participated in a biometric health risk assessment; coordination of municipal employee nicotine patch giveaway; (4) four Cranwell Spa days; coordination of insurance partnership meeting and employee risk assessments. Unfortunately, due to budget constraints, the program will be cut in Fiscal Year 2010.

Mass in Motion Grant: Once again, thanks to Kim's superb grant writing skills, this office was awarded \$120,000 from Health Resources in Action (former Medical Foundation). The focus of this grant will be to utilize our regional approach in working with community partners; building on already in-place structures and Built Environment models; assessing sustainable policy; systematic and environmental change and strengthening community-wide accessibility to effectively reduce obesity and encourage healthy lifestyles. We look forward to working closely with Berkshire Health Systems, Berkshire Regional Planning, Planning Boards and other community organizations so that we can create a safe place for the public to engage in healthy eating and active living.

Kimberly A. Kelly: Kim successfully passed classroom and field training requirements for soil evaluation in accordance with 310 CMR 15.000 Title 5, and is now licensed by the Department of Environmental Protection as an approved Soil Evaluator.

Lloyd Bannister: "LB" successfully passed requirements of 310 CMR 15.000 Title 5 of the State Environmental Code for Title 5 inspection and is now licensed by the Department of Environmental Protection as an approved Title 5 Inspector.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Lee, Lenox and Stockbridge Boards of Health for their continued support and assistance and the Tri-Town Health Department staff for their dedication and public service in providing essential public health prevention programs to the communities we serve.

COUNCIL ON AGING

The Lee Council on Aging is committed to providing services and programs to community elders 60 years of age and older. Services include blood pressure clinics, hearing tests and repairs, foot care clinic and a flu clinic. An osteoporosis exercise class, Tai Chi class and line dancing are held in the gym at Crossway Village.

Educational programs directed at elders and their families and support members.

Nutritional meals are served at the Senior Center Monday thru Friday in the Community Room/Senior Center. Meals on Wheels are delivered Monday thru Friday to home bound Seniors.

Services also offered are a transportation program to local Doctor appointments, grocery store, Senior Center and other local businesses, also Medical appointments in Gt. Barrington, Lenox and Pittsfield are arranged through the COA office.

A MA state trained counselor offers Health Insurance information and counseling. AARP provides State and Federal Income Tax preparers at the Center during February and March to Seniors. General information and advocacy to seniors and their families is also available.

The COA coordinates programs and services with the Lee Visiting Nurse Association and Elder Services of Berkshire County.

The COA operates with a Director, Secretary, Transportation Driver, Nutritional Site Director along with many volunteers.

VETERANS' BENEFITS AND SERVICES

 ${f T}$ o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

This office serves the needs of the Veterans' of Lee and their families. The case load of Veterans' Services has again been relatively constant this year. The greatest need continues to be for veterans' and their widows who have very little income and are unable to work. A few veterans' have been helped on a temporary basis when they were out of work.

For FY2009 there were many requests for information concerning what benefits a Veteran is entitled to for medical assistance and prescriptions. This office was able to help get that information and to fill out the necessary forms. A growing need is for information and assistance in getting "Aid and Attendance". This is a Veterans' Administration program to assist veterans who are housebound or in a nursing home and unable to care for themselves.

Massachusetts Veterans' Services is beginning a new program in August. It will allow each local Veterans' Services Office to apply for benefits and get information online. This will greatly improve the accuracy of the applications and the time required to get approval from the state.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Commission members researched, for the Chamber of Commerce, who owns the Town sign in Park Square. Member Joe Dupont made the sign and donated it to the town.

Caroline led the Walking Tour of Main Street for Founders Day.

Elder Services requested and received an approval from the Commission regarding the design for senior housing in oldest section of Hyde School. Members also provided a letter of support to MA Foundations for the Humanities for Judith Monochina's book and video project detailing the closing of the Lee paper mills

The Commission provided applications to property owners who would like to purchase historical marker plaques for their properties.

Members provided information about properties on our inventory that are on Jacobs Ladder Trail particularly in East Lee, to the Berkshire Planning Commission, as that organization is updating records with an eye toward preservation of these sites

Barbara Allen and Caroline Young attend a meeting sponsored by the Berkshire Historical Society aimed at promoting information about Black soldiers from Berkshire County who served in the Civil War's 54th Regiment. Both members feel that Lee could contribute to such an effort with its already existing stops on the African American Historic Trail, the marble wall in Town Hall and Fairmont Cemetery, where one of the veterans is interred.

The Commission researched Homer G. & Stella Miller of Lee, who in 1952, were reputed to have a piece of material from the Bostonian Society's Liberty Tree Flag. The Bostonian Society is looking for that material. No information was found on the present whereabouts of either the Millers or the piece of flag.

Gaye Tucker, a researcher, asked the Commission to provide information on the town park, as she is producing a study comparing the Pittsfield, Lee and Dalton open spaces. Members were able to provide enormous amounts of data about the park.

Members were available at all time throughout the year to provide support for residents seeking National Register designations for their properties, alert the Town Manager and Selectmen to potential problems or opportunities regarding historic sites, and answer questions posed by residents and tourists about Lee history.

CULTURAL COUNCIL

 \mathbf{T} o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The Lee Cultural Council's mission is to promote access, education, diversity, and excellence in the arts, humanities, and interpretive sciences within the community. Support for public arts programming is provided to cultural councils throughout the Commonwealth of Massachusetts through funding from the Massachusetts Legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts and is appropriated annually by a central state agency, the Massachusetts Cultural Council. In accordance with state policies and regulations of the Massachusetts Cultural Council, the Lee Cultural Council distributes funds on a local level through two channels: standard LCC grants to individuals and organizations offering a broad range of cultural activities and PASS grants for schools and youth groups to access low-cost admissions to performing arts events and cultural institutions.

The annual deadline for receipt of grant applications to Lee Cultural Council is October 15th. Grants are awarded after careful review by both LCC and MCC Councils. The Lee Cultural Council was one of the first local councils in the State to achieve "streamlined" status. Criteria for streamlining includes strong local procedures, a history of member training and a clean approval record. The streamlining process eliminates numerous steps in the yearly funding cycle and speeds up local reimbursements. Grant applications, reimbursement forms and general information are now available on the Massachusetts Cultural Council website.

Lee Cultural Council received and reviewed a total of 36 grant applications for Fiscal Year 2009. Eighteen projects, with total funds of \$4,300, were approved. The Lee Cultural Council sponsors visiting artists in Lee schools, including Shakespeare & Company's nine-week residency at Lee High School. Other projects have included school trips to the Norman Rockwell Museum, music programs for seniors, Lee Founder's Weekend cultural activities, and free workshops and performances for children and adults at Lee Library.

In addition to its funding from the Massachusetts Cultural Council, the Lee Cultural Council solicits funds from local businesses and individuals through an annual appeal and various special events. These tax-deductible funds raised on a local level may be used to augment the amount awarded by the State but are not restricted to state approvals.

JACOB'S LADDER SCENIC BY-WAY, INC.

The Jacob's Ladder Trail Scenic Byway organization during the past fiscal year completed a major project, which was the rehabilitation and new construction in Hampden Park in Chester. This park is now handicap accessible, has a new pavilion, stone walls, and kiosk; landscaping has been restored and extended, and visitors to the park will have access to Walker Brook, which borders the park. Landscaping projects in Russell, Becket, Lee and along the Westfield River were extended to a December, 2009 end date. They will include plantings at the Russell VFW area of the Byway to improve the roadside vegetation; plantings at the intersection of the Byway with Route 8 in Becket where the intersection will receive new trees and shrubbery to improve its appearance; at the crossing of the power lines in East Lee, the planting of wildflowers in the turnout; and finally, along the Westfield River selected clearing of vegetation to provide views of the river. During the year we worked with the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission and the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission on a new Corridor Management Plan and generated a series of new endeavors to preserve and enhance the Scenic Byway. Lee representative Dee Dee Fraser has firmed up plans for our 2010 Centennial celebration with speakers and activities to which the five Scenic Byway towns will be formally invited.

Meetings are now held bi-monthly at the Becket Town Hall and the public is invited to attend.

A memorial donation was received this year in the name of Irene Brown (sister of Flo Goodman). Marcelyn Weiss was remembered by her grandson, Steven Ostrow, with the gift of her favorite Ravel CD music. Lina Grogan's nieces and nephews gave a donation in honor of her 70th birthday. Historical collection gifts were received from Barbara Mahoney ("DAR minutes of meetings, 1998 - 2001"), Marv & Stewart Steadman's daughter (assorted pictures of Lee), Anthony Fay (Jacob's Pillow file), Anne McKinstry (her new hymn book), Patricia Brown (pamphlet by Edward S. Rogers on the East Lee Flood of 1886), and Myron Hood (DVD of Lee Historical Society meeting of April 16, 2009). Lloyd Johnson and Elizabeth Rajec, two of our Gallery exhibitors, also made donations this year. Carol Langer gave us a museum pass for Ventfort Hall. We received a magazine subscription from Denis Brown. Anne Gannon gifted us with five passes to Trustees of Reservations properties for 2009. Thank you to the Toole Agency for their annual donation of bookmarks that help keep the wear & tear to a minimum on our books. Golden Hill Nursery has donated our beautiful porch boxes which were carefully tendered by Bill Sinico.

Our Summer Reading Program "Wild Reads @ your library" saw increased participation this year due to our new Public Services librarian Rosemarie Borsody. 115 children joined this year, reading 1305 books! Jay Mankita did a "Veggie Voyager" program and storyteller Davis Bates with musician Roger Ticknell both presented very entertaining programs due to grants from the Lee Cultural Council. A first ever this year was an adult summer reading program that was enjoyed by all who joined. Participants were invited to a program by Richard Clark who transformed himself into "Mark Twain"!

There were many Gallery happenings this year. For starters, we re-named the Gallery in honor of the retirement of our long-time President J. Peter Scolforo. It was celebrated with a reception sponsored by the Board of Directors on December 3. The Gallery is undergoing a makeover as we are upgrading the furniture and technical equipment needed for programs. Two hundred forty-three meetings were held by community groups and there were eleven art exhibits this year including a "Picturing America" exhibit from a grant of the National Endowment for the Humanities. CreativeLEE VIII was opened on Founder's Weekend with many creative gems from lots of our local artists. It was a great display—it seems to get better and better each year! This event was also taped and is being edited for CTSB-TV viewing.

The library now has wireless internet service throughout the building! Bring in your own computer and settle down for a session in one of our relatively quiet spaces. Our Museum Pass Program has been expanded this year from 12 passes for 7 venues to 22 passes for 16 venues. Added this year were Historic Deerfield, Freylinghuysen Morris House & Studio, MassMOCA, and five Trustees of Reservations venues. You can charge a pass out on your library card overnight and return it the next day before we close.

CW/MARS (our library computer network) continues to serve our library well. We added a new staff computer for our technical services department, and installed a PAC computer in the children's room. This coming summer we will have a volunteer to help do one-on-one tutoring with patrons who need a little bit of training on our PAC computers. Remember, you can still renew books, request books and materials, keep a record of the books you have read, download audio-books, and access the statewide databases – all from your home computer. You can still call the

circulation desk and have us request titles for you or have us renew items for you!

WMRLS (Western Massachusetts Regional Library System) also continues to supply us with inter-library loans of items not in CW MARS, bookmobile deposits of DVD's, videos, audios, large print books, and westerns. Services like these are available to libraries in the Western Massachusetts area by WMRLS. We are very grateful to WMRLS for all their help and expertise.

LitNet of South Berkshire continues to offer free one-on-one tutoring in basic reading, English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), and preparation for the General Educational Development (GED) test to earn the equivalent of a high school diploma. This year they have 120 tutor-student pairs working together. Of those, there are 30 tutors from Lee, and 44 Lee students. Three tutor-training sessions were offered this year. They are always looking for tutors and students and can be reached at 243-0471.

Board members Mary Philpott and Sandy Hayes have put in many hours changing the displays in the library. A pastel workshop with Greg Maichak was sponsored by the Lee Cultural Council and the Board of Directors. Volunteer Lynne Fay of Otis continues to do pre-school story hours on Wednesdays, and special theme programs throughout the year.

This year the Board of Directors invited a group of 16 library supporters to become "Corporators" or goodwill ambassadors of our Association. These first members are: Barbara Allen, Malcolm Chisholm, Amy Consolati, Jeanne Davidson, Dick Lindsay, Anne Lostrangio, Leo Mahoney, Norma Maroney, Jane Membrino, Joyce Monachina, Lisa Sloane, Sharon Terry, Donna Toomey, Eleanore Velez, Barbara Unsworth, and Hilary Walker. We are proud to welcome our first corporators! The official duty of a corporator is to attend the Annual Meeting of the Association in September. Throughout the year they may be called on to write a letter of support for grants and legislation. They may be called on to sit on an ad hoc committee or focus group to help develop the library's new long-range plan. There may also be special events and activities at which corporators show their support. Corporators give back to the community by helping support Lee Library's mission "to be a primary community resource by providing free access to resources in a variety of formats, including current technologies, within and beyond our walls." The work of this body with the Board of Directors will allow us to continue the fine tradition of service that has been our hallmark for nearly 140 years.

The Board of Directors is composed of President Mary Philpott, Vice-President Judy Nardacci, Treasurer William Noonan, Clerk Sheila Viale, and members Dolores Birch, Tom Consolati, Zoe Dalheim, Sharon Delorme, Sandy Hayes, Deborah Maroney, Janis Monachina, and D. Lynn Shaw.

Thank you to the members of the Board of Directors, our Corporators, and all the Staff Members of the library with whom it is a pleasure to work! Together, we hope to make this library a valuable resource for all our patrons and citizens of Lee, now, and in the future.

PLANNING BOARD

During the year June 30, 2008 to July 1, 2009, the Lee Planning Board acted upon seven (7) Form A Applications (Plans Not Requiring Approval under the Subdivision Control Law), six were approved and one application was withdrawn without prejudice. The Board also made decisions concerning twenty (20) Special Permit Applications all twenty applications for Special Permit were approved. The Planning Board reviewed all applications for permanent signs. Several site plans were also brought before the Board for hearing and comment.

The Board worked on an amendment to the zoning map of a portion of Rte 102 to be rezoned from (I) Industrial to (RB) Rural Business. There was also an amendment to Section 199-16 of the Zoning Bylaws to allow motor vehicle repairs in the (I) Industrial Zoning District with site plan approval and secondly to allow large facilities the latitude to lease space within their facility for commercial uses. Both of these amendments were endorsed by the Planning Board at a Public Hearing in April and adopted at the Town Meeting in May.

The Board approved a proposal for a Definitive Plan from William Glassner for the development of a eight lot subdivision in Leisure Lee entitled, "Moose Drive".

The Planning Board approved four special permits and four site plans for the redevelopment of the former Diesel Dan's site from F.L. Roberts. The proposal includes the construction of a four-story hotel, restaurant, convenience store, car wash and fueling station.

Anthony Caropreso was voted in to serve as Chairman this year replacing Robert Birch. The Board regretfully accepted Martin Deely and Thom Swift's resignations. The Board welcomed new members Helen Gasparian and Thomas Wickham.

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

 \mathbf{T} o the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The State 911 Department considers our Communications Center a regional dispatch because we dispatch for Lee police, fire, and ambulance, as well as for Tyringham fire. Because the Communication Center serves multiple agencies, we applied for and received a State 911 Department Incentive grant in the amount of \$111,407. The grant was used entirely to build upon our current radio infrastructure to enhance existing communications with police, fire and EMS personnel.

Over the course of the fiscal year the grant allowed for the purchase and installation of a new computerized radio console, and new radio base stations and antennas at the Communications Center, Central Fire Station, and the South Lee Fire Station. Other equipment was installed to boost radio signals to the Communications Center when police officers are in South Lee. In addition, portable radios were purchased for police, fire and EMS personnel enhancing overall communication interoperability with the Town's emergency service provides.

With their new enhanced radio system, computer aided police dispatch, video and audio security monitoring of locations within the Town Hall, prisoner suicide prevention duties, Elder Well Being Check Program and the myriad of other services they provide, the Communications Center continues to be an invaluable resource to both emergency service providers and the community.

I would like to thank the dispatchers for their continued professionalism in what can sometimes be a very difficult job under stressful circumstances. I would especially like to thank Dispatch Supervisor Donna Tyer for her continued assistance.

During these distressing economic times we wish to report with pride that we have level-funded our budget for the past two years and plan to continue to do our part to bring down town costs.

We also shifted the burden of responsibility among the lifeguards to produce greater efficiency among them. What had gone missing during these 20 years has been *mature* leadership on the lifeguard stand. In a personnel move that cost no new monies to the town, we obtained permission from the Personnel Board to hire a managing lifeguard whose job description would be more comprehensive than that of a head guard and whose resume would include supervisory experience in the field of recreation.

Angel Burnell of Pittsfield was hired to fill the post. She was assisted by Megan Streeter of Lee and Katie Barnoski of Lenox. They functioned as a close team, updating beach rules and regulations and continuing to follow the protocol of carefully making daily log reports three times a day and filling out accident reports as they occurred. We also can assure townspeople that our staff is performing their best and giving the taxpayers a good return on their investment. The beach is consistently complimented for its cleanliness and well-kept grounds.

We are happy to report there were no major accidents or incidents.

A part-time police officer from the office of Chief Ronald Glidden checked passes on weekends and holidays. We are grateful for their service.

Bathers in large numbers came to the beach, especially on very hot days. We were happy to see many picnics and birthdays held in the grove and we were pleased to host local organizations such as the Lee Fire Company. Our opening day popcorn and watermelon party filled the air with happy shouts of Lee children on vacation for the summer.

Angel Burnell conducted lifeguard classes in early August. These were a success despite an onset of cloudy and rainy weather.

Sheriff Carmen Massimiano's work crew from the Berkshire County House of Correction got our grounds (and all aspects of the beach) ready during the first week in June, and the Lee Kiwanis prepared the grove for the coming summer. We wish to thank these fine teams.

The committee wishes to thank our loyal beach supporters and our fine highway department, and other town boards and volunteers for their care and interest. Thanks again are given to the mill for the use of the beach road, and to the Wilde family of High Lawn Farm for allowing the Town to use part of their lovely property as a beach area.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS 2008-2009

There is a saying that states, "Going to school does not make a person educated, anymore than going to a garage makes a person a car." When you consider the ingredients that create an educated, literate, articulate, thoughtful and decent young person, you quickly realize that the work of the school is really the work of an entire community. One of the very real challenges that face our community is how to better coordinate community and school efforts for the betterment of kids' educations, the betterment of kids' lives, and ultimately the betterment of the community itself. Approaching the challenges of educating our children for the rigorous economic competition of the 21st Century should be on the minds of all as we reflect on the past academic year.

As with many other institutions and individuals, the economy was a primary driver in many difficult decisions during the 2008-2009 school year. The 2009 Annual Town Meeting witnessed the school department coming in with a budget that was 1% lower than the budget brought forward the year before. Among the most drastic cuts were line items that impact the materials and supplies that student and teachers use every day-books, paper, pens, teaching manipulatives, etc. Every department in the schools and in the district was effected by the economic situation in the Commonwealth and Nation.

The most striking loss we faced last year the loss of the Lee House Carpentry Program, and its teacher, John Reilley. Mr. Reilley dedicated more than two decades of his life to preparing young people in Lee for the building trades, and his wit, wisdom and talent for bringing out the very best in the teenagers he worked with is deeply missed. So too will the House Building Program's vocational partnership with the Lee Kiwanis Club, who have sponsored more than 30 projects in Lee. The Lee Public School wishes John all the best, and thanks the Lee Kiwanis for their dedication to our students. We are also grateful to the many community members who served on the House Carpentry Advisory Board over the years. This program was a model of school and community relationships working for young people, and we are deeply saddened by its loss.

Our schools continue to work to meet the challenge of the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System. We had historically high scores in some areas this year (6th grade math and English Language Arts, 10th grade English Language Arts, Low Income students across the district). We continue to struggle in many areas, however, and continue to work diligently to improve areas where we are missing the mark.

One of the new ways the state is measuring school and district effectiveness is through a newly instituted "Growth Model" that determines the

growth individual and groups of students have made as compared to their same-age peers around the Commonwealth. Student growth is presented in percentiles-for instance, a 4th grader whose Student Growth percentile is 62 has learned at a better rate (as measured by the test) than 62% of students like this student across the state.

Across the district, our average student growth percentile in math was 40; in English Language Arts it was 50. This means that in math students in Lee learned a better pace in Math than 40 of students across the state, and better than 50% of students in English Language Arts. While we are pleased that many of our students are progressing at or better than average, our information clearly illustrates that we have more work to do in getting more students more proficient as measured by the MCAS test.

Chris Davis retired from service in the Second Grade at Lee Elementary School. Aniela St. Peter retired after serving as a special education teacher and reading instructor. Both of these teachers honored children with their dedication, their professionalism and their kindness. These teachers will be remembered all, and tremendously missed by all.

We also bid a happy retirement (and a sad goodbye) to paraprofessional Terry Clarke. Terry has served children from Tyringham and Lee for many years in the Lee Public Schools. Terry touched many, many lives beyond the students she was assigned to work with. We are all richer for having the pleasure and privilege of working with Terry.

In the Central Office, Debbie Holmes completed a career in finance. Debbie served as the District Business Coordinator for 22 years. Debbie was respected across the county and the Commonwealth for her depth of knowledge. Debbie was one of the constants in the Superintendent's office, and her intellect, knowledge of Lee, sense of humor and her attention to detail made her a true treasure. We all wish her much happiness in her retirement.

The Lee Public Schools involvement with the South Berkshire Educational Collaborative continues to be strong and beneficial. Last year we had 12 students participate in taking full high school courses through Virtual High School, a Maynard MA based online instructional company, through an SBEC agreement. The SBEC, under the leadership of Executive Director Peter Kopcha, continues to work, toward the formation of a larger, county-wide collaborative in order to recognize more opportunities and savings.

The SBEC is the recipient of several large grants through both the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, and through Representative Olver's office. These monies will help grow the Collaborative. The Collaborative continues to serve the community through its English Language Learners' program that we host in the evenings in the middle and high school.

The Lee Public Schools are committed to student achievement and student opportunity. We are honored to have the opportunity to serve the students of Lee, Tyringham, Otis and many other neighboring communities. Our students continue to thrive and do great things following graduation, and we are confident that Lee graduates will continue to make our community proud. We are dedicated to serving this community to the best of our ability, and to continue to work to be the best public school system we can be. I am personally and professionally very grateful to be part of the Lee Public Schools, and our entire staff and student body is grateful to the Town of Lee for its continued support.

 \mathbf{I} t is my privilege to submit the report for the 2008-2009 school year to the community of Lee.

Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS)

We hold MCAS preparation as an important responsibility for students in grades seven through twelve. Our programs and efforts focus on the MCAS preparation and as necessary, MCAS remediation. We strive to help students earn scores to ensure graduation with an eye on first-time passes in English language arts, mathematics and for the first time, a science requirement in biology for the junior class. We proudly report that the members of the graduating Class of 2009 worked diligently to meet these MCAS standards in English language arts and mathematics.

Student Activities

LMHS students are committed to several extra-activities for the betterment of our school and community. At the high-school level, they are involved in the service through our chapter of National Honor Society, Student Council, Students Against Destructive Decisions, National Honor Society, and the newly formed program for Community Suppers. Students have tutored their peers during homework assistance programs hosted in the library with separate sessions for middle and high school students. Lee students have delivered food to the Lee Food Pantry and walked in Construct's annual fall Walk for the Homeless. High school students hosted events to heighten awareness about destructive decisions and overall safety during the holidays, the prom, and the graduation season. Lee Middle School students have participated in a number of activities such as newspaper, MS Student Council and junior varsity sports. Finally, similar to their high school peers, they have strengthened the role National Junior Honor Society plays in developing middle school pride in academics and commitment to the service of others.

Vocational Education

The LMHS House Carpentry Program constructed a 2 car garage at an existing residence on Highfield Drive as well as various small projects throughout the school district. Instructor John Reilley and a crew of 7 students contributed their skills and talents to these efforts.

Fine and Performing Arts:

Visual Arts

Lee Middle and High school students were busy all year creating projects that were displayed in the front lobby. There were watercolor paintings of the art room in September, Martin Luther King Jr. collages in January and decorative clay egg rattles

in April. In addition, a grant brought sculptor Ann Jon back to LMHS advanced art students to take them on a tour of the Sculpture Now Exhibit in Great Barrington. There was also over sixty of our students fortunate to have a generous community member, Mrs. Lola Jaffe, sponsor several trips to New York City to see a Broadway play and a museum exhibit. Finally, we hung the 15th Annual LMHS Art Exhibition in the Lobby of the Henry T. Zukowski Performing Arts Center. Art students from the middle and high school participated and displayed their work as a culmination to a school year worth of productivity and creativity. It was another wonderful and successful year in the Visual Arts Department.

Dramatics

The members of the 2008-2009 Drama Club were involved in two performances this year. In the fall, we collaborated with Shakespeare and Co. to present *Twelfth Night*. Our musical was the comedy and love story *Carnival!*. The Drama Club also sponsored a Halloween dance. Seniors Alison Crandall and Katie McMillan were awarded the Drama Club's annual scholarship as part of graduation activities and Jeffery Fusco received the first Michael P. Quinlan Memorial Drama Scholarship.

<u>Music</u>

The Lee Middle and High School Music department had an exciting school year in 2008-2009. 7th Grade Chorus was added to the Middle School schedule for the first time, under the direction of Joanne Nelson-Unczur. Eighteen students participated, and the chorus performed at the Winter and Spring Concerts as well as the Middle School Recognition Ceremony. A 7th and 8th grade Middle School Chorus is planned for 2009-10.

The bands performed their annual winter holiday concerts, a 5th-12th grade band concert, a spring concert, graduation, and several home football games. Their talents were displayed at several local parades, including Lee Founder's Day in the fall and Memorial Day parades in Otis, Sandisfield, and Lee. The High School Band attended a Boston Symphony Orchestra open rehearsal in April. They learned about the composers and pieces prior to the event, and met with an orchestra member before the performance.

The Lee Middle School Band won a gold rating at the Great East Music Festival in June 2009. Several students participated in the Western District Music Festival: Oscar Courchaine, Sara Fitzhugh, Maureen Feldman: Junior District Band; Sadie Clouser, Megan Martin, and Katrina Snow: Junior District Chorus; Avery Forget: Senior District Chorus and All-State Auditions.

More than 20 students participated in the after school high school chorus program under the direction of Pat Feldman.

<u>Athletics</u>

During the 2008-2009 school year at Lee Middle and High School a large number of students continued to enjoy success, camaraderie, and character building through athletics. Close to 50% of our student body competed on 12 varsity, 10 junior varsity and/or 4 cooperative teams.

During the fall, the girls' soccer team had a record of 8-8-2 and qualified for the Western Mass Tournament. The boys' soccer team also qualified for the tournament. The volleyball team won its second consecutive Berkshire County title, and a first round bye in the Western Mass Tournament. The football team finished the season at 5-5.

In the winter, the boys' basketball team won the Berkshire County Southern Division Championship, and they advanced to the second round of the Western Mass Tournament. The girls were Division III Western Massachusetts Champions for an unprecedented sixteenth time in the last twenty years. We also had students participating in cooperative teams with neighboring schools in wrestling, hockey, swimming and skiing.

In the spring, the girls' tennis team qualified for the Western Mass tournament with a regular season record of 9-7. The boys' tennis team was very young this year, and showed a great deal of promise for the seasons to come. The girls' softball team qualified for the Western Mass Tournament, and the baseball team took some steps in the right direction. There were also 27 students who participated on a cooperative team in track & field.

Academic Teams

The Lee Middle and High School Quiz Team began its 2008-2009 season in October. The participating schools besides Lee were Taconic High School, Lenox Memorial Middle and High School, Pittsfield High School, Wahconah Regional High School, St. Joseph's High School, Hoosac Valley Regional High School and Monument Mountain Regional High School. Members of Lee's team were Katie McMillan, Avery Forget, Stephanie Rydell, Kaitlynn Drees, Samantha Daoust, Maeve Guinan, Zachary Lindsay, Ashley Smith, Emily Kirby, Emily Glidden.

Lee Middle and High School students also competed in the Western Massachusetts Academic Decathlon. The theme for the 2008-2009 competition focused on Central and South American History and Darwin's Theory of Evolution. Members of the decathlon team were Nicole Delmolino, Stephanie Rydell, Amelia Cox, Zachary Lindsay, Alison Crandall, Rahul Sangar, and Liana Alicia. The team did well.

Lee Middle and High School's TV Team had a short run in the TV program "As Schools Match Wits." Members of the Lee team were Stephanie Rydell, Zachary Lindsay, Torrence Chrisman, and Josephine McDonald. The coaches for the three

academic teams were Joshua Hall and Keri Wade with assistance from Kathy Hall.

Rounding out the academic competition was the Mock Trial Team, who competed with Westfield High School, Longmeadow High School, and Southwick-Tolland Regional High School. The team worked very hard this year as we were unable to procure a lawyer to help. Although we lost our first two matches, the scores were within a few points of the winning scores. Regardless, we had three students receive perfect "10's" for their work during the trials. The Lee team members were Nicole Delmolino, Julie Slater, Brittany DelGrande, Zachary Lindsay, Jeffery Fusco, Avery Forget, Dylan Mechek, John Scarpa, and Molly Porter. The coach for this team was Joshua Hall with the assistance of Kathy Hall.

LEE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Lee Elementary School welcomed a total of 433 children throughout the 2008-2009 school year. As we saw students move in and out of district, we ended the year with 377 students. We also had the pleasure of welcoming three new staff members: Stephanie Walker Burtt- 2nd Grade; Marcy Fennelly- 3rd Grade; and Carrie Weiler St. John- 4th Grade. We also welcomed Mary Somes as a recess/cafeteria supervisor and Sandra Boylston as an Occupational Therapist.

It was with great sadness that we said good-bye to two outstanding educators who retired: Christine Davis- 2nd Grade and Aniela St. Peter- Reading Specialist. We are honored to have had such dedicated professionals working at LES. Now we undergo the hard process of finding new staff to fill their shoes!

Instruction

As in past years, we continued to look at student achievement and tightening up the curriculum. Our Math and Science Curriculum Teams completed pacing documents and local assessments to be used in grades K-6. The pacing documents will enable us to sort out what needs to be introduced, developed, or taught to mastery at each grade level. The assessments will provide us with information about where our students need additional instruction on certain benchmarks and where we are currently meeting their needs.

With the addition of the Wilson Foundations program in Kindergarten as part of their daily reading instruction and as an intervention in first grade, we saw an increase in student's pre-literacy skill scores based on our reading benchmark testing.

In an effort to meet the needs of some of our low income subgroup in Math achievement, we offered Supplemental Education Services through our Title 1 grant. This program took place after school for 14 weeks. Under the instruction of three LES teachers, small groups of students were given additional instruction in math computation and problem-solving.

In April, a Reading/Writing Curriculum and Assessment Team was formed to begin work on English/Language Arts pacing guides for K-12, common rubrics, common graphic organizers, and a common language for teaching reading and writing skills consistently. A group of teachers will meet over the summer to begin work on the pacing guides and will continue to work on these throughout the school year.

Other Exciting Events

This year, we formed a Character Development Committee in conjunction with our Bullying Committee. The Character Development Committee established the three R': Respect, Responsibility, and Ready to Learn. This common language is spoken in all grades to all students so they understand what is expected of them at all times. Additionally, we held monthly assemblies called Community Gatherings where we introduced staff, rewarded students for excellent achievements, and gave classes a "Chance to Shine" and show-off what they've learned this year.

As always, we offered several opportunities for students to participate in extra-curricular activities. This year, students were able to get involved in the newspaper, Student Council, maple sugaring, drama, physical fitness and sports clubs, band, the Special Olympics, and chorus. We are extremely grateful to the staff members who sponsor these clubs before, during, and after school.

The third grade took part in a special salmon hatching project during the school day. The Atlantic Salmon Egg Rearing Program (ASERP) was initiated to help repopulate the Connecticut River with Salmon. Working with the Fish and Wildlife Service, grade three hatched and raised about 400 Atlantic Salmon eggs in the classroom. In late May, grade three took a field trip to release the salmon "fry" into the Connecticut River.

We also had the fantastic opportunity to participate in some grant-funded programs through the Housatonic Environmental Literacy Program. The Mass Audubon and Housatonic Valley Association formed a grant-funded collaboration called the Housatonic Environmental Literacy Program. Our fourth graders went on a "Survival Tracking Day" where they learned basic survival and tracking skills on the center's trails. The fifth graders participated in a long-term program learning about the Housatonic River that culminated with a fun canoe trip! It was very exciting for us.

Some of our fifth grade classes also took part in another grant-funded program through the Flying Cloud Institute. The fifth graders worked with Jane Burke from the Flying Cloud Institute on a unit called Geometry Through Acoma Ceramics. The math goals from the program are understanding geometric shapes, angles, lines, fractions, and symmetry. The artistic goals include manipulating colors, shapes, lines and patterns to create symmetrical designs.

Our students attended many field trips throughout the school year. The "classrooms on the road" included: Ioka Valley Farm, Plymouth Plantation, Bard College at Simon's Rock, various museums, etc. Grades 1 and 2 attended a performance of *Stellaluna* based on the story by Janell Cannon at the Mahaiwe Performing Arts Center in Great Barrington. Mr. McCandless secured a cultural grant offered by Berkshire Bank to fund this exciting, worthwhile trip. It was a wonderful

opportunity for our first and second graders and everyone had a great time. A special thank you also to our wonderful PTO for helping out with the costs of buses and/or admission prices of many of our field trips!



LEE HOUSING AUTHORITY

With the financial position the state of Massachusetts is in, this year was a huge financial challenge. Our fiscal year '09 budget was level funded and our apartment turnover was exceptionally high in our 667 and 705 programs. We have relied on our 4001 programs operating reserves to get things done to re-rent these apartments. At this time our operating reserves have been depleted to DHCD's minimum percentage.

We requested from DHCD to have two major projects funded at Brown Memorial Court this year. The stairwell enclosure project has been given the go ahead with money coming from DHCD Capital Improvement Fund. Bradley Architects has been hired to design the job. The job has been advertised and construction bids due on June 17, 2009. At this time we are waiting for DHCD bid approval. Job will be done in fiscal year 2010. The paving, drainage and sidewalk project has been put on hold at this time because of lack of Capital Improvement funds. We are looking to secure funding from another source.

The Budd House did get its bathroom update this year. We used our 689 programs operating reserves for this program to do the work. Work was done by Northeastern Commercial Services. This year was no different from the last five years in maintaining the buildings with no rental increase.

This year we had no town elected official to our Board of Directors. Our state appointee, Sandy Cozzaglio, term will expire in July 2009. We have requested to the Governor's office to have Sandy reappointed as our state appointed board member. Sandy has been an asset to the housing authority and we would like to have her on the board for another five years.

Babe Buffoni worked another year for the housing authority from January through March. Babe does a great job and we would like to say thank you.

The Board renewed a five year contract with Executive Director Sherri Miller.

Despite lack of funding because of the state's financial situation we have survived another challenging year.

Carlino moved that the Town accept the provisions of chapter 258, section 13 of the Massachusetts General Laws to indemnify and save harmless municipal officers, elected or appointed, from personal financial loss end expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, in an amount not to exceed one million dollars, arising' out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of any act or omission, except an intentional violation of civil rights of any person, if the official at the time of such act or omission was acting within the scope of his official duties or employment. 2nd by G. Bailey. Lengthy discussion. P. Carlino made a motion to postpone this article until next Annual Election to be placed on an official ballot in 2009. 2nd by G. Bailey. Lengthy discussion with an explanation by Town Attorney Jeremia Pollard the reason for postponing this article that it has to be voted on by Town voters. A. Heddinger made a motion to pass over this article and 2nd by D. Delorme. More discussion. D. Delorme withdrew his motion. More discussion. A. Heddinger made a motion to pass over this article **40 by majority.**

ARTICLE 41 - G. Bailey moved that the Town accept the provisions of chapter 43D of the Massachusetts General Laws as amended pursuant to Section 11 of chapter 205 of the acts of 2006, and to approve the filling of an application with the Interagency Permitting Board for the designation of land at 73 West Center Street

(Eagle Mill/Map 12A, Lot 64) and 1085 Pleasant Street (Laurel Mill/Map 30, Lot 71) as a Priority Development Sites. 2nd by P. Carlino. **Vote- yes by majority.**

ARTICLE 42 - P. Bailey moved that the Town approve the establishment of an Economic Opportunity Area EOA) in the area shown as Lot 71 of Assessor's Map 30 in the Town of Lee (Laurel Mill) for a term of not more than twenty (20) years for the purposes of allowing eligible certified projects within the BOA to participate in the Massachusetts Economic Development Incentive Program pursuant to the Massachusetts Economic Development Incentives Program (EDIP) M.G.L. 23A, Sections 3A-3H. 2nd by P. Carlino. **Vote- yes unanimously.**

ARTICLE 44 - P. Carlino moved that the Town approve the establishment of an Economic Opportunity Area EOA) in the area shown as Lots 7, 9, 10 and 105 of Assessor's Map 25 in the Town of Lee (F.L. Bailey made a motion to have Jeremia Pollard act as Moderator for this article. 2nd by P. Carlino. All in favor-yes. Lengthy discussion with Mary Brittain explaining this article. **Vote- yes unanimously.**

R. Christopher Brittain is Moderator for the rest of the meeting.

ARTICLE 46 - P. Carlino moved that the Town repeal entirely Section X, Cluster Development Paragraph 199-58 and replace it with a new Flexible Development bylaw Paragraph 199-58 as published in the Warrant. 2nd by G. Bailey. Lengthy discussion - with explanation by M. Deely. C. Kalischer made a motion to amend the

article to delete #3 & 4 under M. 2nd by D. Consolati. Lengthy discussion. C. Kalischer made a motion to amend her amendment by putting back #4 under M. 2nd by A. Collins. Vote- does not pass by majority. More discussion. Motion to end discussions. 1st by A. Heddinger and 2nd by P. Carlino. Vote- yes by majority to end discussions. Vote on amended motion to strike #3 & 4 under M-Vote- yes 1 and no-majority. Does not pass. Motion to move the question- 1st by B. Briggs and 2nd by G. Bailey. Vote- yes by majority. Vote on main motion as read-yes 36 and no 7. Article passes by majority.

ARTICLE 47 - G. Bailey moved that the Town repeal entirely Sections 199-80 Operating Center Signs and Section 199-81 Individual Business Signs of Article XIII, Planned Commercial Village Center of the Town of Lee Zoning Bylaw, and replace them with new sections 199-80 Operating Center Signs and Section 199-81 Individual Business Sign as published in the Warrant with the changes highlighted. 2nd by P. Carlino. J. Graziano abstaining from this vote. Very lengthy discussion with M. Deely calling D. Hunter for explanation of this article. **Vote- yes by majority yes-32 and no-9. Article 47 passes.**

ARTICLE 48 - P. Carlino moved that the Town commit to reducing its carbon footprint through programs to promote energy conservation and efficient uses of resources and to engage the citizens of Lee in a cooperative effort to follow the guidelines provided by the U.S. Mayors' Climate Protection Agreement and the Cities for Climate Protection campaign. 2nd by G. Bailey. **Vote- yes unanimously.**

ARTICLE 49 - G. Bailey moved that the Town return to Open Town Meeting form of Government, and request any special legislation required to initiate the process. 2nd by P. Carlino. Slide presentation by M. Ryan. E. Briggs made a motion to move the article. 2nd by J. Graziano. Vote- yes unanimously to move article. **Vote-yes 15 and no 29. Motion fails. Article 49 does not pass.**

Moderator thanked Finance Com, Capital Outlay Com., Oversight and Sewer Com. for all their hard work and to Mike for holding the Microphone.

Motion to adjourn-1st by W. Noonan 2nd by P. Carlino. All in favor-yes
